Lent, A Eucharistic Time ... "The Eucharist draws us into Jesus' act of self-oblation ... we enter into the very dynamic of His self-giving' (Encyclical Deus caritas est, 13). #### Looking Back and Moving Forward ....

During April-May 1995, the Parish Building Committee worked with Clark Enersen Partners, Inc *(architects from Lincoln)* to come with preliminary sketches for a "Master Plan". Then from July- September, the Parish Building Committee worked with Jim Brown Construction from Holdrege *(a Design/Builder)*, to come up with the original blue prints for the Parish Hall on Sept. 28, 1995 which were revised on Oct. 10, 1995. During August-September 1995, workers prepared the building site for the construction of the Parish Hall. In October, footings were poured and concrete blocks for the foundation were laid. In November-December, workers started framing the Hall.

As the construction was beginning on the physical building of the Parish Hall, our Parish was also growing spiritually, and looking beyond our own Parish to help others. Parishioners met in the Old Rectory on Thursday (beginning in late September 1995) for RCIA classes to grow in their faith. In October 1995, the CCD Students and Teachers sponsored a "Rosaries for Russia" project (coordinated by Phyllis Beckius) and requested the donation of Rosaries (new, used, or broken - to be repaired) for shipment to Russia. "Rosaries for Russia distributes rosaries to people world-wide who are experiencing religious freedom after years of domination by the former Soviet Union. Many of these countries are also in economic turmoil, and have poor distribution systems. Our local effort will be part of a national Family Rosary program, founded by Holy Cross Father Patrick Peyton." 75 Rosaries were collected.

In the November 19, 1995 Bulletin, Fr. Brethour wrote: "Many Things To Be Thankful For ... Thanks to all of you for a very good year this past year. So many of you are involved in the life of the parish -- teaching CCD, involved in adult education, the parish council, building committee, Daughters of Charity, preparing meals, rectory maintenance, rectory cleaning, rectory lawn care, Sunday Mass set-up, earthmoving at the building site, office help, typing the bulletin, typing papers, working with servers, serving as lectors, acolytes, servers, ushers, coffee and rolls, special projects and music. This list seems never to end!

While being small means we must each shoulder more of the load, we also enjoy the satisfaction of our personal contributions, and the wonder of getting to know and appreciate one another more deeply. What a gift! As I ponder this list, WOW! We do have a lot of great things happening, because of the high level of involvement among our parishioners. We might pause and ponder God's generosity, which cannot be outdone. Thank you, and thanks be to God."

In the December 3, 1995 Bulletin, Fr. Brethour wrote: "Rolling Along ... The first layer of our parking lot has been placed. The three inches of asphalt millings will be covered with two inches of regular asphalt next Spring, when weather permits. Please feel free to drive on the millings. We want them to be well packed and settled before we add the top layer."

In late December 1995 / early January 1996, some of the CCD students began a pro-life project to build small wooden crosses to symbolize the number of babies aborted each month in the State of Nebraska. After some time, these wooden cross were replaced with the metal "re-bar crosses" that are still standing to the Northeast of the Parish Hall.

**TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION** ... Hollywood has given us an image of Moses slipping off his shoes before a burning bush. God has just called Moses by name, and so that Moses doesn't miss the meaning of this breakthrough in human history, God requires that all barriers to the experience be eliminated. If you've ever tried to maneuver barefoot across hot sand, or pick your way along a rocky beach, you know how sensitive feet can be.

Within the Church, there are religious orders with a custom of going barefoot, not merely to show poverty, but to be an outward sign of a desire for connection with creation, a desire to go through life alert to what God is doing. In early days, when reconciliation was a once in a lifetime possibility, penitents often went barefoot for a long period of time as a sign of their conversion. Even today, people follow an ancient practice of slipping off their shoes to walk in the procession to the cross on Good Friday. It is striking that the first use of our newly scrubbed feet from Holy Thursday night is to walk resolutely in the footsteps of Christ to the cross. —James Field, Copyright © J. S. Paluch Co.

**MID-LENT CHECK-IN** ... God says to Moses, "This is what you shall tell the Israelites: I AM sent me to you ... # HOLY FATHER'S INTENTIONS ...

(March) <u>Evangelization</u> - That Christian communities, especially those who are persecuted, feel that they are close to Christ and have their rights respected.
