ADORATION on Holy Thursday ... After the Mass of the Lord's Supper (Holy Thursday), parishioners are asked to spend one hour in adoration: A-H (10-11), I-P (11-12), Q-Z (9-10). 19

GOOD FRIDAY COLLECTION ... On Good Friday, the collection will be for the Holy Land. This money is used to maintain the Catholic shrines in the Holy land, to alleviate suffering there among the Christian population & to help retain a Catholic presence in the place where Christ redeemed the world.

COME TO THE EASTER VIGIL ... In order to fully appreciate the beauty and the mystery of the Easter Vigil, it must begin after dark! This is one of the most impressive and beautiful Masses of the whole Church year. Experience it this year!

### **Looking Back and Moving Forward ....**

On Sunday, March 24, 1996 the First Sunday Mass was prayed in our new Parish Hall! The Dedication of Parish Hall by Bishop Fabian Bruskewitz was Sun., June 2, 1996. During that Mass, Bishop Bruskewitz confirmed 15 of our students.

We had our second Parish Mission from Monday, April 8 - Thursday, April 11. Fr. Brethour wrote in the April 8, 1996 Bulletin: "Please invite a friend to attend with you! We all deserve a parish mission. We all need it. Pope John Paul II says a parish mission is an irreplaceable good. The Parish Mission will be preached by Fr. Charles Mangan, vicechancellor, Diocese of Sioux Falls, South Dakota. He is an excellent preacher."

In the May 19, 1996 Bulletin, Fr. Brethour wrote: "Because we are a new parish we designed this facility to be a multipurpose building to serve our needs for religious education, Mass and fellowship. In the very near future, the chairs that we ordered should be here. When they arrive, we will remove the back pews that have the open back and replace them with the chairs. This will give us the option of bringing out tables (also ordered) and putting the chairs around them for coffee and rolls, meetings, etc. The dark oak pews (with the full back) will remain at the front of the parish hall. I know that many of us like the present arrangement with all pews. However, it does not give us the needed versatility. When we first started this project, our Diocesan Building Commission was very insightful, when they said to build a parish hall, not a church, because we have so many diverse needs right now. So with the arrival of the chairs we get the best of both worlds, pews with kneelers for those who have trouble kneeling, and chairs to use for Mass, and social activities. In the near future (we do not have a firm date), Brown Construction will be back to finish the tabernacle enclosure on the back side. Then we can start to arrange the adoration chapel." [This was a great invention by Fr. Brethour, the Tabernacle was placed on a "lazy susan" table, so that it could be turned to be in the Parish Hall and then turned to be in the Adoration Chapel when the Hall was being used as a Hall and not as a Church. It served us very well for 15 years!]

**TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION** ... Next weekend, many churches provide palms to be carried in the opening moments of the liturgy, as we gratefully recall Jesus' entry into the holy city of Jerusalem. The children who greeted him on that day used what was both handy and traditional, since palms were carried to inaugurate the joyful harvest feast of Succoth. To this day, faithful Jews are directed to take a beautiful palm branch, green and straight as possible, called a *lulav*, and bind it with three myrtle branches fifteen inches long, and two longer willow branches. At the end of the temple service, everyone carries the *lulav*, circling the sanctuary in a dance called the *Hoshanot*, singing hymns of joy.

In other climates, Jews and Christians alike have had to make accommodations over the years. In Italy, everyone carries olive branches today, often brought from their own garden. In England, forsythia branches are preferred, a relative of the olive, sign of peace. Germans prefer pussywillows, and others look for flowering spring branches. In our part of the world, what do you think would be the best choice to express joy and welcome, and to remind us of the joy of Christ's victory even as we prepare to commemorate his passion?
