FROM FR. MARK SEIKER:

Possible New Digital Sign ... on the Parish Council Ballot (03/31/19), there were listed some options related to a possible digital sign. The options listed were *[with numbers of votes received on left]*:

20 ... I think we need a new Digital Sign. I would be willing to donate/contribute to it.

- 19 ... I think we need a new Digital Sign. I think we should wait until our current Loan is paid off.
- 16 ... I do not think we need a new Digital Sign.

0 ... Other comments ... [there were a few emails & phone calls that I received regarding a new digital sign, expressing concern that a digital sign was not traditional, & would take away from our beautiful Church. This week, I visited with Fr. Hottovy, Jean & Char Kriz (who are mainly responsible for the beauty of our Church). They did not think that a digital sign would in any way detract from the beauty of our Church. The persons who would design and/or lay out the words & pictures that would be on a digital sign would need to choose carefully the pictures/words that would be used to convey the correct message. The flexibility of the sign is very good!

We have received some donations toward a new sign totaling \$3,600 and some promises of donations totaling \$5,200. If others would like to make a donation or a promise of a later donation toward a digital sign, please let me know. We will purchase a digital sign if there are enough donations and/or interest for the new digital sign.

Ten years ago, when we were praying, meeting, deciding on what, when, and how to build our new Church, there were various persons who expressed concerns about the financial conditions in our nation at the time, the cost of a new Church, the possibility of adding the "burden" of a large debt to our younger families and younger children, and other concerns. Our parishioners have worked together as a family, received assistance from persons very skilled with beauty (Fr. Hottovy, Jean & Char Kriz, Eileen Ratigan, and others), sacrificially contributed from their financial resources to our Capital Campaigns, while also contributing to the regular Sunday Collections, AND at the same time continued to build new friendships, strengthen existing friendships, and meet new daily challenges together. We have welcomed new Parishioners, felt sorrow when parishioners move away or die, and shared our Faith & friendship with persons who later became Catholics and joined our Parish Family!

I cannot think of another Parish in our Diocese that has accomplished what our Parish has accomplished in 25 years: beginning from scratch, forming a Parish Family, building a Parish Hall, building a Rectory, purchasing "the Farm" rental property, building a new Church (together totaling over \$3.3 million), while at the same time flourishing as a Parish Family, addressing current local needs (Parish, Diocesan, Community, e.g. flood victims, etc) as we strive to deepen our friendship with Jesus, & invite others closer to Jesus. All this from 100 families!! (Over 25 years it has been as low as 88 and as high as 105 families, but it has mostly been right at about 100 families).

Some have expressed that the idea "Built it and they will come!" did not necessarily bring new families to our Parish (we are still at 100 families after building our beautiful new Church). Spending money on a new digital sign will not necessarily bring new families to our Parish. Neither will buying new music books, a new webpage, a renovated Kitchen, more storage space, giving money to the poor, or having all of our parishioners spend one hour each week in Eucharistic Adoration. All of these items (listed in the previous two sentences) are good & we should undertake each of them as time and money allow, but especially as our commitment to the Lord and His Church deepens!!

Most especially, each one of us are encouraged by our Risen Lord to take the Gospel that we have received with us into our world and share it with those that we meet each day. That is how the Catholic Church has changed the world in the last 2,000 years & how St. Elizabeth Ann Seton Parish has changed our area of the world in the last 25 years!

Looking Back and Moving Forward

In the July 28, 1996 Bulletin, Fr. Brethour wrote: "Thank you Jo Ginapp for working so hard to get our parish lending library ready for business. Many books, audio tapes, and VCR tapes are available for your enjoyment. When checking out an item, please fill in the card you will find with the item and leave it in the file card box. The library is named after the old parish outside of Osceola, Nebraska that provided our beautiful tabernacle." This Library continues to have many fine Catholic books. Some books are available to be checked out, and others are for reference only (to be used / read in the Parish Library or in the Church during a Holy Hour and then returned to the Library). After Jo Ginapp's health did not allow her to care for the Library, there have been a few parishioners who have given some of their time to care for the Library. Currently, we are in need of a person(s) to care for our St. Andrew's Parish Library.

Beginning in the summer of 1996, four teams of "Cleaning Crews" took turns keeping our Parish Hall clean. "*The generous volunteerism spirit of our parishioners makes our parish a strong family.*" We had a Parish Picnic on Sunday, Sept 1, 1996 after the 11:00am Mass.

In the September 15, 1996 Bulletin, Fr. Brethour wrote: "Msgr. Mike Jackels (now Archbishop Michael Jackels, Archbishop of Dubuque, IA), Director of the Diocesan Office of Religious Education, will be here the weekend of Sept. 28-29 to preach at the weekend Masses concerning Eucharistic Adoration. We will use the occasion to kick off our parish's Eucharistic Adoration program. Next weekend we will have sign up sheets available for you to schedule the day and time that you will commit to come and pray for an hour each week before the Blessed Sacrament. Parishes that have a Eucharistic Adoration program are richly blessed with many graces. Thank you to Gregg Thuman for volunteering to organize the scheduling of adoration times. Our goal is that every parish family be represented each week for an hour before Our Lord Jesus. The Parish Hall is open from about 7:00am until about 9:00pm each day. Please come in and adore and pray before our Eucharistic Lord. Jesus is waiting for you."

Life is Victorious! ... "Jesus Christ our King is Risen! Sound the trumpet of salvation!" *(Easter Exsultet).* Today is the Feast of Feasts, the foundation of all that we celebrate in our faith. By rising from the dead, Jesus did not only conquer his death; he conquered ours. He overturned the entire kingdom of death! TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION ... Over the centuries, the Church has demonstrated a wonderful ability to adopt a culture's favorite symbols and customs and assign them new meaning. Easter eggs have a very ancient pedigree: nature's perfect package, emblem of new life, dyed and decorated and given as gifts in ancient Egypt, Rome, China, and Persia. Just as the long hard winter is over, the egg bursts with promise of life and nourishment. Long ago, Christians came to see the egg not as a symbol of spring's rebirth, but of ours, and as a sign of Christ's tomb. A Polish legend says that Mary, in compassion for the soldiers at the cross, gave them eggs, but that her tears stained their shells with brilliant color. Legends have their origin in tales told around a hearth, but they often contain a profound truth.
