May each of us continue to treasure the awesome gift it is to receive our Lord in Holy Communion. Thanks to all who helped with the First Communion Mass: the ministers at the Altar & to Greg Vandenberg for providing music. Thanks especially to our teacher, Mrs. Heather Johnsen for the gift of her time to teach the "little ones". Thanks also to those who helped with the Brunch in setting up, decorations, food, serving, and clean up. It was greatly appreciated.

#### Looking Back and Moving Forward ....

In the Jan 17, 1999 Bulletin, Fr. Brethour wrote: "On Sunday, Dec. 6<sup>th</sup>, 1998, 17 members of our parish participated in a 5 hour strategic planning meeting led by Fr. Joe Walsh and Dr. Benes from Catholic Social Services. We identified 5 areas of Apostolic Priority: 1) Outreach 2) Community 3) Education 4) Spirituality 5) Catholic Tradition. We started our problem solving work by picking Catholic Tradition and came up with this problem statement: "There is insufficient knowledge and lack of confidence to live and defend our Catholic traditions." A potential solution is a question & answer box in this bulletin, or bulletin insert. We now need to work out the details. Next Strategic Planning meeting is scheduled for 7:00pm Thursday, January 28. Dr. Benes and Fr. Walsh will lead us through another problem solving exercise so we are trained to do this work without their help and can work on the other areas of Apostolic Priority.

Two parishioners from each parish in the Diocese went to St. Louis to attend Mass celebrated by Pope John Paul II in the Trans World Dome on Wed. Jan. 27.

In the December 13, 1998 Bulletin, Fr. Brethour wrote: *"Some have talked or asked about our parish purchasing hymnals. Music is very important to our worship of God at Mass. We have put off the decision on a hymnal for several years. The choice of which one to get is not easy. Our Diocese is trying to address this issue. Bishop Bruskewitz has a strong committee of priests and sisters looking at various hymnals. We should hopefully hear the results by summer of '99'."* 

Beginning March 21, 1999, our Parish Mission started. Fr. Brethour wrote: "Many of us are experts when it comes to maintaining healthy bodies. We know what we need to do. But, how much more important is a healthy soul? Our bodies last 70 years or so, but our souls last forever. Let us pray and attend our Parish Mission so that the Divine Physician, Jesus Christ, can help us form healthy souls. We place such a high value on earthly bodies, whereas God, our Creator, places an infinite value on our immortal soul. Let us set aside tin1e this week for our soul by attending our Parish Mission. Topics: Sunday - Marriage as a Eucharist Monday - The Divine Mercy Tuesday – Reconciliation; Wednesday -Prayer and the Blessed Virgin Mary Thursday - The Cross; Feel free to invite relatives and/or friends ... even those who are not Catholic ... the Mission Message is for everyone."

In the June 6, 1999 Bulletin, Fr. Brethour wrote: "Thank you to Tim, Paul and Loren Griffin who dug out the dirt to prepare for the concrete sidewalk to the statue of Mary. Also to Jim Dodson Bob Snider, and Reiny Burbach for preparing the forms. We will need wheel barrow pushers Monday June 7 about 9:30am. Jim, Joe, Jerry and Don Dodson, Ken Bjornstad, Ed Rieker, Larry Baye, Tim Griffin, Jerry Volesky, Ray Slowinski, Reiny Burbach, Mark Miller and Don Exner all came to offer their services to help us lay the concrete sidewalk to the statue. What a great group who came to help on a Monday morning. We have a tremendous, charitable parish!! God bless you."

**TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION** ... Frequent fliers today have many ways to accrue air miles, so one doesn't always have to endure long hours in cramped seats to earn free hours in cramped seats. In St. Paul's day, there were no such perks, nor would there have been any legal system for him to protest the shipwrecks he endured. He had other rewards in mind. The churches that he established in the catalogue of cities from today's first reading must have been very different from one another. Language, culture, customs, religious history, obstacles to community, social challenges, the places where they met, their clothing, their bread and wine, all distinct, particular to the area. There were social customs as well: in a Christian household, the only place where a slave would be able to stand legally as an equal with the master would be at the table of the Lord, because at that table a new world of reconciliation was imaged. While Paul revered local customs, he was relentless about challenging the ways that people lived their Christian lives and how their worship reflected them. It is much the same today, as a global Catholic Church seeks to respect local customs and culture, allowing for differences in many things, yet always giving expression to the underlying presence of Christ, who binds us all together into his body. —James Field, Copyright © J.
