From Bishop Conley ... Greetings in the Lord. The U.S. bishops are joining together in a commitment of prayer and reparation leading up to the bishops' general assembly, where we will be making critical decisions in response to the clergy sexual abuse crisis. With my brother bishops across the nation, I will be dedicating myself to seven days of intensified prayer & fasting, from Mon., Nov 5 – Sun., Nov 11. The intentions for this period of prayer and sacrifice are three-fold:

- For the healing and support of all victims of clergy sexual abuse.
- For the conversion and just punishment of the perpetrators and concealers of sexual abuse.
- For the strength of the bishops to be holy shepherds in protecting and leading our sheep from all harm.

If you feel called to do so, you are welcome to join me in praying for these intentions. I would also be grateful for any prayers for me and my brother bishops during our general assembly, that we may follow the guidance of the Holy Spirit in responding to the tragedy of clergy sexual abuse in the Church.

Please be assured of my prayers for you, as well. Bishop Conley.

PRAYERS FOR THE DEAD ... "It is a holy & pious thought to pray for the dead." (2 Macc 12:45). One of the corporal works of mercy is to pray for the dead. Those persons whom we have loved during their life here on earth, we should still remember to pray for after they have died. **The best prayer of all is the Mass**. Envelopes are available at the Bulletin Board in the Narthex to request Masses to be offered for the repose of the soul of any of your loved ones. The usual Mass stipend is \$10.00. Simply write the name of the deceased person on the envelope and your name and enclose \$10.00. If you write a check, please make the check payable to St. Elizabeth Ann Seton Church and write "Mass Stipend" in the memo. The Mass intentions are listed in the Bulletin. Pray for the dead!

An **indulgence** is granted the Christian faithful who devoutly visit a cemetery and pray, if only mentally, for the dead. This indulgence is applicable only to the souls in purgatory. This indulgence is a plenary (full) one from Nov. 1 through Nov. 8 & can be gained on each one of these days. On other days of the year this indulgence is a partial one.

An indulgence is the remission of the temporal punishment due to sins that have already been forgiven. An indulgence can be gained by doing certain works of devotion, penance & charity, under conditions that the Church has set down. An indulgence is partial or plenary, as it removes either part or all of the temporal punishment due to sin. An indulgence can be gained for oneself or for souls in punishment due to sin. (CCC 1471) The official list of works & prayers that have an indulgence attached to them, as well as the conditions that must be met, are contained in The Handbook of Indulgences.

Besides the exclusion of all attachment to sin, even venial sin, the requirements for gaining a plenary indulgence are the performance of the indulgenced work and fulfillment of three conditions: sacramental confession, Eucharistic communion, prayer for the pope's intentions. The three conditions may be carried out several days before or after the performance of the prescribed work. But it is more fitting that the communion & the prayer for the pope's intentions take place on the day the work is performed.

Consecration to Jesus through Mary .

Bishop Conley is encouraging the faithful to consecrate/re-consecrate themselves to Jesus through Mary according to the method of St. Louis deMontfort on Dec 8th, the Solemnity of the Immaculate Conception. The 33 day preparation period begins November 5th. The Rosary Crusade (specifically Br. Julian, KHE) has made video meditations for each day as a way to go deeper with our consecration this year. RCIA Classes ... on Wednesday in Parish Hall, 7:00pm – 9:00pm, will continue until mid-May 2019. It's not too late to join.

Consecration to Jesus through Mary ... I highly encourage each of our parishioners to participate in the Consecration to Jesus through Mary. There are short daily meditations (5-6 min each) and also daily prayers (in print and audio files; it might be helpful to some persons to click on the audio file link in one browser window and then in another browser window to click on the prayers/text link ... in this way, you can listen and read at the same time, thus using more senses to apply the message to your life). There are also 2-3 paperback books of the Consecration prayers available for those who do not have and/or use the internet.

Stewardship ... God wants all of us to be Saints, and to proclaim the Gospel by our actions as well as with our words. Jesus wants to use our weaknesses, wounds, and inadequacies, to allow His Light and His Glory to shine through us. St. Paul said "When I am weak, it is then that I am strong" ... that Christ shines through me!

One area of Stewardship that is often overlooked and needs to be put first, is the <u>Stewardship of our Time</u>. God has given each one of us the same 24 hours each day and the same 168 hours every week. Each one of us should ask ourselves: How am I using the time that God has given to me? Is God a "<u>part</u> of my life" or is God "<u>in</u> my life"? Reflect on your day or your week. Ask yourself:

- Do I have a daily "appointment" with God for prayer, Scripture reading, study of Faith, Rosary, Divine Mercy Chaplet, etc?
- Do I have a weekly Eucharistic Holy Hour ... time with Jesus in the "classroom of silence"?
- Do I give Jesus the first and the best of my time ... of my day ... or do I give Jesus the "left over's"?
- Do I give of my time to my spouse / to my family?
- Do I give of my time to my Parish Family?
- Do I give of my time to share my Faith with those that I meet?

TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION ... Just two years ago, we engaged in one of the core activities of our democratic system: a presidential election. Actually, the institution of election can be traced to traditions in the Church, and although bishops are no longer chosen in this way, abbots and abbesses (heads of monastic communities) have almost always been elected by full voting members of their communities. The lifetime appointment begins when the monks or nuns are gathered in "chapter" at the death or resignation of the abbot, and fortunately for all involved, campaigning is not allowed! The members of the community discern, with prayer to the Holy Spirit, who among them is the best suited for leadership. Once chosen, the new leader requests the blessing of the local bishop, who usually presides at a ceremony of consecration or investiture. The ballots are always secret, and a simple majority must be achieved. In our American system the Electoral College is the determining voice in the presidential election, not the popular election on a November Tuesday, just as the monastic chapter is the electorate. Today, most religious orders elect general superiors in "chapter" by delegates of the professed members, and usually for a term of six years. A few, like the Jesuits, elect for life. At least we don't have that weight on our shoulders when we choose a president. Four years at a time will do! —Rev. James Field, Copyright © J. S. Paluch Co.
