TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION ... Life hands us many epiphanies or "wake up calls." A few years ago, a young couple adopted a two-year-old child in a morass of red tape, complications, and court hearings. At the baby's baptism, the priest suggested appending an "adoption blessing," wherein the new relationship was expressed and affirmed. There is a place in that rite for the child to speak, and instead the priest said, "Can you give Daddy a kiss?" Standing in the midst of his church, the young adoptive father suddenly welled up with tears as he embraced the child. Afterward, he explained that through all the hassles and legal struggles he never until that moment in church understood that he was the parent of this child. The ritual claimed them for each other, gave expression to their relationship that the legal documents never could, and firmly cemented this child into the heart of a community as everyone erupted into heartfelt applause. This assembly witnessed in a powerful way what happens in every baptism: the mystery of adoption, the free flow of grace, the overwhelming sense of God's presence at the heart of our life's journey. —Rev. James Field, Copyright © J. S. Paluch Co.

TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION ... We are in the season of the Incarnation, the mystery of God's love poured out in Christ's birth. The word derives from the Latin *carnis* meaning "flesh." Throughout history, some Christians have distrusted the "flesh," and stressed a hatred of this world and its pleasures. Perhaps they have not paid enough attention to how "embodied" the sacraments are. One third-century author put it plainly in an image that may alarm diet-conscious Americans, explaining that we wash the body so the soul can be cleansed, that we anoint the body so the soul can be strengthened, and that we eat the body and blood of Christ so that "the soul can fatten on God." Catholics "get" that God is revealed in this world. The sacraments use the "stuff" of creation: water and oil; the senses of the

Catholics "get" that God is revealed in this world. The sacraments use the "stuff" of creation: water and oil; the senses of the body, touch and taste and smell. We use the things of this world rightly. After all, God's love poured out into human flesh means the world has eternal value. Why else would Jesus describe the kingdom to come as a teeming city or a marriage banquet? Catholics are realists, and nowhere is that more evident than when we gather for a sacrament. —Rev. LIGHT OF THE WORLD ... Epiphany can be understood as an extension of the Nativity of the Lord that we celebrate on December 25. While at Christmas we celebrate Jesus' coming as the long-awaited king and Messiah of the Jewish people, on Epiphany we celebrate the revelation that Jesus is the Savior and Light of all nations – Jews, Gentiles, and all people. The star shines so brightly that it attracts magi who come from far distant countries to worship Jesus. They are not Jews, yet they are drawn to the Light of the world. The letter to the Ephesians reveals that the Light of the world was for the Gentiles as well as the Jews – Christ gathers all people into the light of his love. - ALL: LORD, HEAR OUR PRAYER.

(All then pray together the prayer of St. Francis of Assisi:)

Lord, make me an instrument of your peace:

where there is hatred, let me sow love; where there is injury, pardon; where there is doubt, faith; where there is despair, hope; where there is darkness, light; where there is sadness, joy.

- O Divine Master, grant that I may not so much seek to be consoled as to console, to be understood as to understand, to be loved as to love.
- For it is in giving that we receive, it is in pardoning that we are pardoned, it is in dying that we are born to eternal life. AMEN.

BLESSING OF HOMES ON EPIPHANY

(In the Universal Church, Epiphany is a Holy Day of Obligation, Jan. 6, the "Twelfth Day of Christmas". In the United States and other countries which do not observe Epiphany as a Holy Day, the celebration is usually transferred to the Sunday after New Year's Day. If desired, the following explanation may be used as an introduction to the blessing of homes.)

The blessing of homes on Epiphany is a very old Catholic custom. When the Wise Men or Magi became an important focus of the celebration of Epiphany, the blessing of homes was a natural conclusion: The Wise Men came to bring gifts to honor the King of Kings; but when they entered the home at Bethlehem, they were blessed by Him whom they came to bless! Since the high Middle Ages, the names Caspar, Melchior, and Baltassar have been given to the Magi, and they have been honored as saints; there is a magnificent reliquary of their alleged remains behind the high altar of the Cathedral of Cologne, Germany. The actual facts and history of the Magi are not nearly so important as the celebration. We, too, are always blessed by those whom we go to bless. To give is to receive. To dedicate our homes to Christ is to gain untold blessings from Him who manifested Himself in glory to the world on Epiphany. In the golden age of liturgy, two other mysteries were also celebrated on Epiphany: the Baptism of Jesus by John the Baptist and the Wedding Feast at Cana. Each of these mysteries gives meaning to the blessing of homes. By sharing in the wedding feast of Cana. Each of these mysteries give meaning to the blessing of homes. By sharing in the wedding feast of Cana, Jesus blessed married life and family life in the home. By His baptism, Jesus was consecrated as the Suffering Servant of the Lord. He began His mission to reconcile and to save; we begin our mission as Christians from our family life in the home.

Leader:Peace be to this home and to all who live here! Blessed be God the
Father and the Son and the Holy Spirit who live within us!ALL:NOW AND FOREVER!

Leader: In the third Mass of Christmas Day, we heard the opening words of the Gospel according to John: "In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God! He was in the beginning with God. All things came to be through Him, and without Him, nothing came to be. And the Word was made flesh and made His dwelling among us, and we saw His glory, glory as of the only-begotten Son of the Father." When the translation says that He "made His dwelling among us", the real words are "He pitched His tent among us." It teaches the very down-to-earth and personal presence of Christ with us. He is here in this home. May He always be in our hearts. Today in signs and symbols, we renew our realization of the presence of the Lord in our home. The family gathers at the front door. The leader marks over the door, with a piece of chalk, the following: 20 + C + M + B + 20. He then says:

Leader: We have written the number of this year together with the initial of the Magi, Caspar, Melchior, and Baltassar. May God always send His angels to dwell in this home. May He keep us always in His peace and love. May we provide welcome to strangers and to those in need. May He bless our coming and our going so that everything that comes to this home or goes forth from this home may always be guided by the light of faith, hope, and love. We ask all these things through Christ, our Lord. AMEN.

The family then goes from room to room sprinkling each room with holy water. If the room is more significant to one member of the family, that member of the family may sprinkle that room, and lead the petition. As the family goes from room to room, the following -- or other petitions (more suited to the family) may be used. Petitions below which are not relevant should be omitted. After sprinkling all the rooms (or representative rooms) the family gathers back in the living room or family room.

- (Dining Room) Bless us, Lord, when we eat our meals together. May the food we take here make us long for the Bread of Life, and may our meals here be a pledge and foretaste of the banquet you prepare for us in heaven. We pray to the Lord.
- ALL: LORD HEAR OUR PRAYER.
- (Kitchen) Families must work together and cooperate in preparations for meals and in cleaning up afterward. May God bless the work of each of us, and make us appreciate the work that each contributes for the good of this family. We pray to the Lord.
- ALL: LORD HEAR OUR PRAYER.
- (Parents' Bed Room) Fathers and Mothers are given the awesome responsibility of guiding their children in this world to the world to come. May the Father and Mother of this house always be guided by the Holy Family. May God give them wisdom and strength to guide this family always in truth and in love. We pray to the Lord.
- ALL: LORD HEAR OUR PRAYER.
- (Baby's Room) God gives the precious gift of life. May we always reverence every life, and care for those who need our care the most. May God watch over and keep our baby safe from all harm. We pray to the Lord.
- ALL: LORD HEAR OUR PRAYER.

- (Boys' Room) Jesus was a boy. He understands and knows each of us better than we know ourselves. May He guide us always and help us to grow. May He make us humble in good times, and may He give us strength and humility in bad times. In everything may we serve Him as best we can. We pray to the Lord.
- ALL: LORD HEAR OUR PRAYER.
- (Girls' Room) The greatest human person who ever lived was a woman. Before she was a woman, she was a girl. Mary did not always know what God had in store for her, but she followed in faith. May God bless our femininity, our girlhood, our young womanhood. May He guide us always so that our lives may give Him glory. We pray to the Lord.
- ALL: LORD HEAR OUR PRAYER.
- (Garage) From here we go, to here we come. May God protect us on our journeys and bring us safely back home. May He give us wisdom and skill and patience in driving so that we shall always respect our lives and the lives of others. We pray to the Lord.
- ALL: LORD HEAR OUR PRAYER.
- (Bathrooms, closets, utility rooms) So many rooms are necessary for the good functioning of the home. May each room always show forth our respect for each other. May we work together to keep them clean so that the entire family may always enjoy this home in its fullness. We pray to the Lord.
- ALL: LORD HEAR OUR PRAYER.
- (Family Room or Living Room) In this room we watch television, we read, we talk, we entertain friends, we relax, we hear music. May everything that we do in this room be done for the glory of God. may all that we hear and all that we see be worthy of His presence in our home. We pray to the Lord.
- ALL: LORD HEAR OUR PRAYER.

The family then joins hands and prays together the Lord's Prayer. A favorite hymn may be sung. Then all say:

MAY GOD BLESS US AND KEEP US IN HIS LOVE THROUGHOUT THIS ENTIRE YEAR. AMEN.

An appropriate time for the removing of the Christmas crib and other decorations is at the completion of Epiphany, i.e. on the night before the celebration of the Baptism of the Lord.
