Do You Struggle to Pray? Make a Plan ... (by

Father Gary Coulter, director, Our Lady of Good Counsel Retreat House)

Do you struggle in your prayer life? That means you're human like the rest of us ... Do you ever have times where prayer seems dry or repetitive? Do you sometimes in prayer do all the talking, making it more like a monologue than a conversation? These problems in prayer are a common experience, at least for me, and I'm sure for many of you.

You may be familiar with the popular speaker and author Matthew Kelly, and his book, The Four Signs of a Dynamic Catholic. In reading through the first of those signs on the prayer of Dynamic Catholics, something really struck me. I had long advocated exactly what Matthew Kelly does, encouraging people who aren't praying daily to start by carving out ten minutes a day to spend in silent prayer and reflection.

Yet what I never realized, is that without any further guidance, what do most people do: they go find their quiet place, try to put themselves in the presence of the Lord, and nothing happens. So they try a second day, and still nothing happens. After a week they give up making time for

daily prayer.

What I had never really thought about, which Matthew Kelly brings out so well, is that people who pray daily always have a routine to their prayer, a plan if you will. You don't show up for your prayer time empty handed - because if you do it is no surprise that 'nothing happens'. Sometimes that literally means you have a something in your hand - the Gospel of the Day, morning prayers, a chapter of the bible, a favorite devotional book. For others it's just having a routine, starting with the morning offering, and talking through the day's schedule with God.

And we must remember that prayer is a conversation, and in a good conversation we can't do all the talking: we also need to listen. I once heard Matthew Kelly speak, and he told about when he first made the commitment to pray 10 minutes each morning, but his prayer was basically planning the events of the day, and saying: "God help me to get through today."

Only with time he came to realize that instead he needed to be asking a question: "God, what do you want me to do today?" In his book he calls this the big question: "God what do you think I should do?"

Now there are probably as many different methods and ways to pray as there are saints. Matthew Kelly recognizes that most people find a routine that works for them by trial and error, and then he goes on to suggest his own six-step prayer process, which if you're interested in you can read more in his book. Those six steps are: 1. Gratitude (thankfulness), 2. Awareness (examination), 3. Significant Moments (experiences), 4. Peace (asking forgiveness), 5. Freedom (conversation), 6. Others (intercession).

If you are beginning to make a commitment to regular, daily prayer, do not make the mistake of thinking, wrongly, that unless you can undertake much, you should not do it at all. Many abandon prayer, not realizing the Lord delights in even short moments offered to him out of love. If you think you must pray hours upon end you will risk becoming discouraged and end up doing nothing. Rather it is better to begin by doing a very little, trusting that even little moments of adoration and of love glorify Him.

Finally, keeping in mind the principle that prayer is a gift and grace of God, we will realize that there is no magic formula for prayer. Yet some methods of prayer have been found helpful by many people over time. Not that we have to use any one method of prayer, nor should we solely depend on methods, for we never want the method to get in the way of our goal of union with God.

Divine Mercy & Pro-Life ... Pope Saint John Paul II declared the Sunday after Easter to be Divine Mercy Sunday. Many of the faithful pray the Chaplet of Divine Mercy regularly. There is a link between this devotion and the prolife movement. Fr. Seraphim Michalenko, MIC, who was a principal translator of St. Faustina's diary, and the postulator of her cause of canonization, writes the following: "On at least three occasions, from 8:00-11:00 in the evening, she felt like her insides were being torn apart. She suffered so much that she thought she was going to die. The doctors couldn't figure out what was ailing her, and no medication was able to alleviate her sufferings. Later, she was given to understand that she was undergoing those pains for mothers who were aborting their children (Diary, 1276). "On another occasion, she had a vision of an angel coming with thunderbolts to destroy one of the most beautiful cities of her country. And she felt powerless to do anything about it (Diary, 474). What antidote did the Lord give her? The Chaplet of Divine Mercy. [She explained] that the city was to be chastised for its sins, primarily the sin of abortion." ("Wombs of Mercy," Marian Helpers Bulletin, Summer 1995, p.13).

TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION ... One of the great Easter traditions is "mystagogy," an ancient word meaning "reflection on the mysteries." It is a style of catechesis, or passing on the faith. People who have shared an experience, in this case those who have been baptized at Easter, are urged to recall their experience, reflect on its meaning, and apply their insights to their new way of life. There is an aspect of an experience that is simply not available until you've had it. For example, you may think you know weddings inside out; you've been to dozens, seen hundreds in the movies or on television, but until you've said "I do" to another, there is a certain knowledge unavailable to you. Those who go down into the waters of baptism as adults have similar experiences; they have all taken baths before, but not like this one! Mystagogy helps such persons to uncover the deep meaning of the experience, their sense of a new beginning, of God's abundant love, of forgiveness, of community. It takes time for the power of the Easter Vigil to work its wonders for us. Those who are newly baptized are called "neophytes," meaning "newly planted." The tender buds of spring need care and nurturing, and our new brothers and sisters need your prayer and your faithful example. —Copyright © J. S. Paluch Co.

GET REAL! ... Those of us who flatter ourselves that we have a "realistic" view of the world may listen to the first reading today and say, "Get real!" when we hear Luke's account of the early, Elysian days of the Christian movement. All seems to be rosy, lots of wonders are performed, everyone shares selflessly, they eat together in "exultation," and the Lord added to their numbers? Well, who wouldn't be attracted to a group like this? From the wind that swept through the upper room at Pentecost as the Spirit of God blew over the face of the waters in Genesis, and the fire that appeared over each disciple as the light appeared at the dawn of creation, Luke's intent in Acts is to show a new creation, a restoration of creation's original goodness through the working of the Holy Spirit. It is the Spirit who continues to make us into the Body of Christ. We may occasionally, like Thomas in the Gospel, say, "Get real!" but our ultimate reality in the Spirit is to work continually to make our Christian community a new creation, one in which others will find God's joy and beauty. -Copyright © J.
