Seven Sisters Apostolate Recommitment ... on Friday, June 19, 2020, the Solemnity of the Most Sacred Heart of Jesus, women who belong to the Seven Sisters Apostolate and invited to participate in the Holy Hour following the 5:30pm Mass. At the beginning of the Holy Hour, the Seven Sisters will recommit themselves to their weekly prayer for Priests for the coming year.

The Eucharist and Unity ... Imagine a person who receives Communion, accepts the Host when the priest says, "The Body of Christ," says "Amen," and then breaks off a piece, hands it back, and says, "Except this piece, Father!" This is what the person who rejects other people may as well do. In receiving Christ, we are to receive the whole Christ, in all his members, our brothers and sisters, whether convenient or inconvenient, wanted or unwanted, born or unborn. As St. John remarks, Christ was to die "to gather into one all the scattered children of God." Sin scatters. Christ unites. The word "diabolical" means "to split asunder." Christ came "to destroy the works of the devil" (1 Jn 3:8). The Eucharist builds up the human family in Christ who says, "Come to me, feed on My Body, become My Body." Abortion, in a reverse dynamic, says, "Go away! We have no room for you, no time for you, no desire for you, no responsibility for you. Get out of our way!" Abortion attacks the unity of the human family by splitting asunder the most fundamental relationship between any two persons: mother and child. The Eucharist, as a Sacrament of Unity, reverses the dynamic of abortion.

<u>#8 The Battle of Prayer</u> ... (by Father Gary Coulter, director, Our Lady of Good Counsel Retreat House)

On helicopters there is the large nut by which the long blades are fitted to the main rotor of the helicopter, known as the "Jesus nut". "Jesus nut" is slang, probably coined by American soldiers in Vietnam; the technical name is the main rotor retaining nut (MRRN). The origin of the slang term refers to how critical this nut is, because if the "Jesus nut" were to fail in flight, the rotor blades would detach from the helicopter, and catastrophe is inevitable. Without the Jesus nut, the only thing the crew could do is pray to Jesus before the helicopter crashed.

Using the image of the vine and the branches (*cf. John 15*), Jesus explains why He must be the pivotal point in our lives. Without Him we can do nothing; but with Him we bear great fruit.

It is through prayer that we experience a living relationship with Him. The quality of our prayer life thus is a measure of our relationship with God. Prayer is talking with God. Prayer is listening to God. Prayer is enjoying the presence of God. It can take many forms: praise, adoration, contrition, thanksgiving, petition; and sometimes it is a prayer of silence, listening and awareness of God's presence.

The Catechism defines prayer as "the raising of one's mind and heart to God or the requesting of good things from God." (CCC #2559) Christian prayer is a covenant relationship between God and man in Christ, thus it is both a gift from God, who helps us to pray, and it is the action of our heart, the habit of placing ourselves in God's presence.

The great figures of prayer, in the bible as well as the saints, teach us that "prayer is a battle." (CCC #2725) While prayer is a gift of grace, and we ask the Holy Spirit to help us to pray – it also requires a determined response on our part: as we know all too well, prayer takes effort, it requires 'discipline' in the sense of training: building habits of behavior and virtue, including the habit of prayer.

One reason prayer is a fight, is because there are many temptations we must overcome; three common obstacles to prayer are distractions, dryness and doubts.

First, we all have distractions at times when we pray, so do not beat yourself up, but rather decide: what am I going to do when distractions come? Distractions can even sometimes help us see what we're attached to: what is keeping my heart from God? Is this something I need to bring to Him and entrust to Him? In any case, whenever we experience distractions, we simply turn back to God, we choose him over anything else.

Second, at times prayer may be dry: we may not feel the presence of God or receive any consolations. We have to battle the feeling of failure in prayer, those times of discouragement or difficulty. Yes, we must pray even we do not feel like praying – and if we remain faithful to prayer in times of darkness and dryness, the Lord will surely reward our perseverance.

A final temptation is doubt, because we all have a thousand things urgently vying for priority, and we will start to ask: am I wasting my time? Is prayer truly important? Why should I make it a priority? When those doubts come, we need to humbly remember Jesus words: "Apart from me, you can do nothing." (*John 15:5*).

To live the Christian life requires that we enter into this spiritual battle of prayer. And to help us face these difficulties, there are three characteristics our prayer should have: prayer must be vigilant, it requires trust, and we must persevere.

Prayer must first be vigilant because our prayer needs to be regular, consistent, and faithful. The good news is that prayer does not require elaborate schemes or take decades to learn, but it does not happen by accident. We need to make a place and time to pray. We learn to pray by praying. And we remain watchful for the distractions, dryness, and doubts, so that we do not give up.

Second our prayer must be trusting, because we will have doubts in prayer and start to wonder: does God really hear my prayers? Why doesn't He seem to answer me?

We are called to confident trust: not only does God hear our prayers, but He always gives us what is best for us and our salvation. Therefore when it seems he doesn't immediately grant what you ask, it is because "he desires to do something even greater for you" (*CCC #2737*), we must deeply trust that he will give us even better than what we ask for.

Finally, against our dullness and laziness, the battle of prayer must be persevering. Indeed St. Paul says that we should pray without ceasing, at all times. Paul is not saying prayer should be long and multiplied: most of us are not called to sit in church for hours on end. Rather, God is looking for a heartfelt relationship; and Paul is saying it is always possible to pray, because the risen Christ is with us, no matter what trials may arise. Given that prayer is vitally necessary to help us bear fruit and do God's will in all things, we should learn that it is possible to pray while walking or waiting in line, while driving or even cooking.

It is absolutely impossible for a helicopter to fly without rotors. And it is equally impossible for us to soar to the heights of holiness, to fully do God's will and attain eternal life, unless we remain in Christ Jesus like branches united with the vine. We foster this relationship with Him through a life of prayer, by fighting the battle against distractions, dryness and doubts. Prayer that is vigilant, trusting, and persevering will lead us to a deep and intimate union with Jesus Christ.

Application: Prayer Exercise ... (by Father Gary Coulter) Making the time and place for prayer, choose in advance a Gospel passage that teaches us about prayer, such as:

- The Lord's Prayer......Matthew 6:5-14
- Do not be anxious, your Father knows youMatthew 6:25-34

- Parable of the widow and the unjust judge Luke 18:1-8
 Parable of the pharisee and tax collector Luke 18:9-17

Use some preparatory steps to enter prayer: 1. Put yourself in God's presence. 2. Ask for his help. 3. Offer God this time & yourself. 4. Picture the scene of the Gospel story. 5. Tell God of your longing & desire.

- Slowly read the scripture passage.
- Listen for something that attracts you and is true.
- Rest in that word, image or sentence; sit and stay with this truth.
- Talk with Jesus about what you heard. What does this teach me about my own life, my own prayer?
- Write it down.

To conclude: Take time to evaluate your prayer. Find your personal way of praying by being aware of what helped in prayer, what worked or did not work. How did I prepare for prayer? Was this time of day of helpful? This place? This posture? What steps did I use?

helpful? This place? This posture? What steps did I use? Also record any gifts, insights and blessings received, how God spoke in prayer; and any resolution, the fruit of prayer: What I am going to do? What changes to my prayer do I want to make?

TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION ... Ordinary Time beckons, and so on this Sunday we surrender the last glimmers of paschal joy as we celebrate the renewal of our life around the table of the Eucharist. This feast reminds us that the goal of the catechumen's journey through Lent is not the baptismal font at Easter, but rather the experience of Pentecost. It is all about life lived in the Spirit's embrace in relationship to the Body of Christ, which is found both "on the table" and "at the table." The season of confirmation is also drawing to a close, and this feast serves as a reminder that this sacrament, a solemn sending from font to table, is keyed to renewed vigor. Confirmation has sometimes been sadly misunderstood as a kind of graduation from religious formation, but it is nothing of the sort. It is about being led by the Lord Jesus to the place where the Spirit flourishes, and where the gifts of the Spirit are most easily detectable. After next week we will resume our consideration of the sacrament of confirmation, its rich and somewhat tangled history, its challenging theology, and its changing celebration. -Copyright @ J.S.
