Violence is not pro-life

In the wake of the killing of an African-American man (George Floyd) by police in Minneapolis on May 25, and the riots that raged around the country for the next two weeks and more, few people seem to have grasped the real core of this matter. The natural inclination by many was to decry racism that still exists. That includes politicians and many clerics, including church leaders.

Racism is a part of the bigger problem, and it still exists, but in a way that many of the indignant politicos ignore or deny all together. The one person in the world so far whom I think has addressed the issue most plainly and directly is Dr. Alveda King, the niece of civil-rights leaders Martin Luther King Jr. The core issue is respect for life.

Martin Luther King Jr. said, "When we learn to value the human personality, we won't kill anybody,"

Alveda King is an evangelical Christian who has worked many years with Priests for Life. She now works with other prolife groups including Stand True, a youth outreach program, and National Black Catholic Apostolate for Life.

In an interview in the National Catholic Register (June 21-July 4, 2020), Alveda King was asked how her uncle would respond to the recent events. "I believe he would advise us to see each other as human beings, not separate races, not socioeconomic differences. Social gospel is different from the Gospel of Jesus Christ." She noted that George Floyd's brother and sister said they wanted justice, not violence. "If we're killing each other, we're not having life," she said. "The heart of a lawless nation leads to degradation."

"When we learn to value the human personality, we won't kill anybody," King quoted her uncle again. She said, "When I look at the issue of life, the little child in the womb, whether that child is black or white, male or female, going to be rich or poor, has some preexisting health condition – that's a person, in the womb."

She said we need to "embrace everyone, from the womb to the tomb. Abortion is an egregious sin. It needs to stop. A woman has a right to choose what she does with her body. The baby is not her body. Where is the lawyer for the baby? How can the dream survive if we murder our children?"

King said, "our work is to promote and share the love of God, in truth, to the born and to the unborn. So faith is very important. We should have faith rather than fear. We should have love rather than hate. We should pray rather than panic."

New Digital Sign ... is nearly completed. The brick from the old sign was removed in Sept. 2019, the new digital sign was installed Sept. 30. New footings beside the existing footings were dug and the bottom bricks were laid in October. The top part of the sign [manufactured for Condon Sign by an out-of-town company] was installed Monday, Oct. 28. Due to schedule conflicts and the Winter weather, the brick contractor was not able to install the remaining bricks [columns on either side of the Digital Sign] until the last few weeks. Condon Sign installed the letters for the address of the Church and will soon connect the wires for the thermometer sensor. Thanks to all who made donations toward the sign!

New Software for the Church HVAC Controls ... will be installed over the next few weeks (maybe one day this week, and then beginning July 6 for 2-3 weeks). The HVAC controls installed 10 years ago for our new Church used JAVA software which now has security issues and is old technology. Johnson Controls, from Kearney will install a new software program and the necessary hardware at a cost of \$24,926.00. Thanks to all who made donations toward this needed and necessary expense!

TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION ... Confirmation is complicated, at least in its history. It arose in response to real problems deeply felt, not the least of which was the desire of the bishop to minister to all who were baptized. But it also has to do with the early crisis of how to deal with persons baptized by congregations that had broken bonds with the greater church: heretics. People reasoned that no matter how wrong headed the minister might be, Christ would always work in the waters of baptism. No matter what, God would sweep aside all human obstacles to claim the new life in the water. They were not so sure about the ability of someone who had broken with the church to confer the Spirit. By the fifth century, already-baptized persons coming into the church were anointed with chrism but not rebaptized. This anointing with myron or chrism was seen as an act of reconciliation by the church, and a seal upon the commitments vowed by the newcomer. Today, we preserve this ancient practice by never "rebaptizing" Christians who have been baptized in water in the name of the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit. We affirm the candidates' baptismal dignity, and we celebrate confirmation at their first reception of the Eucharist. —Copyright © J. S. Paluch Co.
