PRAYERS FOR THE DEAD ... "It is a holy & pious thought to pray for the dead." (2 Macc 12:45). One of the corporal works of mercy is to pray for the dead. Those persons whom we have loved during their life here on earth, we should still remember to pray for after they have died. The best prayer of all is the Mass. Envelopes are available at the Bulletin Board in the Narthex to request Masses to be offered for the repose of the soul of any of your loved ones. The usual Mass stipend is \$10.00. Simply write the name of the deceased person on the envelope and your name and enclose \$10.00. If you write a check, please make the check payable to St. Elizabeth Ann Seton Church and write "Mass Stipend" in the memo. The Mass intentions are listed in the Bulletin. Pray for the dead!

An **indulgence** is granted the Christian faithful who devoutly visit a cemetery and pray, if only mentally, for the dead. This indulgence is applicable only to the souls in purgatory. <u>This indulgence is a plenary</u> (full) one from Nov. 1 through Nov. 8 & can be gained on each one of these days. On other days of the year this indulgence is a partial one.

An **indulgence** is the remission of the temporal punishment due to sins that have already been forgiven. An indulgence can be gained by doing certain works of devotion, penance & charity, under conditions that the Church has set down. An indulgence is partial or plenary, as it removes either part or all of the temporal punishment due to sin. An indulgence can be gained for oneself or for souls in punishment due to sin. (CCC 1471) The official list of works & prayers that have an indulgence attached to them, as well as the conditions that must be met, are contained in The Handbook of Indulgences.

Besides the exclusion of all attachment to sin, even venial sin, the requirements for gaining a plenary indulgence are the performance of the indulgenced work and fulfillment of three conditions: sacramental confession, Eucharistic communion, prayer for the pope's intentions. The three conditions may be carried out several days before or after the performance of the prescribed work. But it is more fitting that the communion & the prayer for the pope's intentions take place on the day the work is performed. **PRAYER TO ST MONICA** ... Looking Back and Moving Forward

In the May 2, 2010 Bulletin, Fr. Seiker wrote: "Ground Breaking Ceremony for the new church was on Saturday, April 17, 2010 at 6:00pm (after the 5:00pm Mass). This date was chosen because Bishop Fabian Bruskewitz was already scheduled to be in McCook for the Diocesan Altar Society Convention on April 16-17. May we continue to pray with the psalmist: "Prosper the work of our hands!" (Ps 90:17) May we continue to ask the Lord to guide the Parish Building Committee, the Parish Council, the Finance Committee, the architect & contractors, and all those involved in the process of building this new church, for "Unless the Lord build the house, they labor in vain who build." (Ps 127:1) A big thank you to those parishioners who volunteered their time and energy to remove the sidewalk leading up to the Rectory, relocate the shrubs/bushes and transfer some sod to the area south of the driveway into the parking lot. It looks nice. Also, a big thank you to Stan at the NMC-Cat Rental Store in North Platte, for allowing us to use a 'bobcat', a concrete saw, & a sod cutter for free. Having the right equipment makes the job much easier. Having it donated helps even more! Thank you!"

Since our last Picture Directory in 2000, it was decided to have the *LifeTouch* Picture Directory company take pictures the last week of April 2010.

Simon Contractors began working on Monday, May 3. The Lord chose to bless us with some cool, wet weather in mid-May, and many rainy days in June which prevented the contractors from doing much work. During May and June contractors prepared the ground and filled and re-compacted the trenches for the footings until the soil test samples passed the soil compaction tests. In July, the footings and footing pads were dug and the footings were poured and finished. The geothermal wells were dug from July-September. The splitface blocks, bricks, and pre-cast blocks were laid during November – May.

In July and August adjustments needed to be made to the dimensions and stain color of the big glue laminated trusses which caused a little delay in manufacturing and shipping the trusses. In August, electrical conduits and plumbing pipes were installed in the sand under the Nave of the church and the geothermal pipes for the in-floor radiant heat were installed in the cry room, transepts, and Nave of the church. In August 2010, the concrete floor was poured for the Narthex, Nave, and Transepts. In early September the concrete for the sanctuary steps and sanctuary was poured.

TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION ... Every week, some treasures from our tradition are shared here. Where does all this history come from? The history of God's people of prayer is always coming to light, mostly because scholars have dedicated their lives to research. They translate and ponder prayers and songs; explore the places used for worship; look at the vessels, books, and vestments; and read works from legal documents to letters and diaries. In the 1930s, Hitler's rush to arm Germany closed seminaries as priests and seminarians alike were drafted into service. One professor, Father Josef Jungman, forced from his classroom, spent the war years in an Austrian library. His careful work disclosed much of what we know of the history of the Mass. His great work, The Mass of the Roman Rite, describes the evolution of Eucharistic celebration and inspired generations of scholars to explore a tradition surprisingly rich and varied. It was said of him that he had a command of the past that cast new light on the present, and opened up a clear direction to the future. His contributions to the Second Vatican Council helped shape the way that we worship today. At the end of his life, in 1975, his studies completed, he told a friend that he was waiting patiently for the Lord's knock at the door to take him to the heavenly banquet. — James Field. Luke's Gospel shows us what this looks like in real life: Zacchaeus, feeling small and excluded, looks for Jesus.
