New Digital Sign ... the top part of the sign *[manufactured for Condon Sign by an out-of-town company]* was installed on Monday, Oct. 28. When the weather is warm enough, the brick contractor will be able to install the remaining brick *[columns on either side of the Digital Sign]*.

Cursillo National Spiritual Advisor ... in June 2019, the Cursillo National Secretariat elected me to serve a three year term as the National Spiritual Advisor which began Oct 1, 2019. From Nov. 7–10, I will be in Omaha, at a <u>National Secretariat meeting</u>. <u>Please welcome</u> Fr. John Rooney (Priest at St. Gregory the Great Seminary).

Looking Back and Moving Forward

There was some "extra" concrete from pouring the nave floor and some parishioners gave of their time on the "spur of the moment" to pour the "extra" concrete for a pad underneath the K-C aluminum can barrels near the shed, along the south side of the driveway off of Echo Drive, & beside the horse tank in the corral on the "Farm". Thank you!

In September workers installed the "red iron steel" in the nave, transepts, and sanctuary. The metal studs on the exterior walls were installed, and then on the interior walls. The OSB (particle board) was installed on the outside walls. In October, Covert Construction in Kearney installed the floor for the Choir Loft and with the assistance of Troyer Crane Service from North Platte, installed the roof trusses over the nave of the church. The TGI rafters were installed in the roof.

From August – June workers installed electrical conduit, electrical boxes, and finally electrical fixtures. During November – December workers from Weathercraft Roofing Co from North Platte installed Heritage 30 year composition shingles to match Parish Hall & Rectory. Tyvek commercial building wrap material was installed over the exterior walls of the church. In November plastic was installed over the window openings to get the building weather tight for winter.

From January – May workers from Mitchell Drywall installed drywall and textured the interior walls and ceilings. The ductwork for the HVAC system was installed from January – March. In January – February insulation was installed. From February – June, workers from Kucera Painting from Kearney, painted the interior walls of the church. The sprinkler pipes and sprinkler heads were installed in February – June, and workers from Nebraska Fire and Safety from North Platte installed the emergency fire system in the church.

From April – September, workers from Engineered Controls from Lincoln, installed the control wires and connections to operate the Heat Pump units in the building. From April – May, workers from Larry's Glass from North Platte installed the metal frames and the clear glass (thermal pane, exterior window) for the stained glass windows.

During April workers from Ambiance by Design from Lincoln, sealed and stained the trusses and painted some gold stars on the ceiling in the Nave and the Sanctuary. From April – September, workers from Ambiance by Design installed the flooring, the corbels, Communion rail, choir loft rail, Altars, Pulpit, the display case frame for the Throne of Grace (Blessed Trinity) stained glass windows and the decorative trim.

In June workers from Lambrecht Glass Inc, from Omaha, installed the stained glass windows (*which they had inspected and made some minor repairs* to over the last 11 months). The low-voltage light switches for the church lights were programmed and adjusted. In June six of the pews that we used in the Parish Hall were moved to the Choir Loft.

In August the concrete in front of the church was installed as well as the sidewalks around the building. Workers from Troyer Enterprises and Troyer Crane Service from North Platte, installed two solid brass crosses which they manufactured and "clear powder coated" above the front door and on the top of the front façade of the church.

In mid August the new pews for our new Church arrived and were installed. After the new pews were unloaded from the semi-truck, our old pews (which we have been using in our Parish Hall for 15 years) were loaded into the semi-truck to be taken back East to St. Michael Parish in Cheney/Lincoln, to be used in their "daily Chapel" in their new school. Members of the Building Committee discussed this and suggested that we were the beneficiaries of many items over the years and that we should donate these old pews to St. Michael Parish in Cheney/Lincoln.

In late August & September, volunteers from our parish installed Creston landscaping blocks and did the finish landscaping around the three buildings. Many have expressed amazement that our parish could have completed such a large and beautiful landscape plan (around the Church, Rectory, Parish Hall) ourselves. Working together all things are possible ... but tractors, bob cats, special skills, hard work, and the oversight of St. Joseph are very helpful!

We were able to pray the Saturday/Sunday Masses for Sept 17-18 and Sept 24-25 in the new Church! The weekday Masses for those weeks were prayed in the Parish Hall. Thank you to those who helped with the cleaning of the church on Saturday, Sept 17 before we prayed the first Mass in our new Church!

The last week before the dedication of our new Church on Sunday, October 2, 2011, many items made by Ambiance By Design were delivered and installed: the Altar of Sacrifice, the Pulpit/Ambo, Baptismal Font, Altar of Repose, Side Altar of the Blessed Virgin Mary, Side Altar of St. Joseph. They also made the large cross & installed the cross & corpus over the main Altar. They also did restoration work & touch-up painting on the plaster image of the Last Supper which was installed in the Altar of Sacrifice. They installed gold leafing on most of the Liturgical furniture. Workers from Sacred Heart Church Art, from Beatrice, have been working throughout the last year on the restoration of the Stations of the Cross as well as the restoration of statues of the Blessed Virgin Mary, St. Joseph, the Sacred Heart of Jesus, St. Therese, the corpus of Jesus for the new crucifix, and the large Angel. The Stations of the Cross and Statues were delivered during the week before the Dedication.

Thank you to all who helped with the preparations for the 4:00pm Mass of the Dedication of our New Church, during the Mass itself, with preparations for the Dinner & the 6:30pm Dinner at Quality Inn & Suites following the Dedication. It was all very beautiful ... as is our new Church! Many Priests & visitors at the Dedication Mass commented on the beautiful singing & chanting by the choir (made up of our own parishioners)!

Based on the reservations we received (including some last minute reservations), we made reservations for 200 for the Dedication Meal. We served about 141, perhaps a few more. The cost for the dinner from Quality Inn & Suites was \$3,070.20. We received donations for the dinner totaling: \$2,438.00. Thus, the parish only paid \$632.20 for the dinner.

For a month or two after the dedication, various contractors did "punch list work".

TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION ... In the seventeenth century, English Catholics, many of them wealthy and well educated, looked to the American colonies as a place to regain a measure of religious freedom. In Ireland, the so-called penal laws were even harsher than in England, as a minority Parliament tried to force the conversion of the population by denying the majority political and economic power. Beginning in 1691, laws were passed that punished dissenters, principally Catholics, but also causing hardship for Jews, Quakers, and others. There were acts forbidding "mixed marriage" or sending children "beyond the seas" for schooling. Catholics were taxed at double the common rate, barred from the legal professions and from university, and not allowed to build churches or own a decent horse.

In 1793 the situation began to change, as it became clear that the economic persecution would not drive the majority away from Catholicism. Gradually, laws were repealed until by 1829 freedom was won, although Catholics at university were ineligible for honors, and until the 1920s when the Republic was formed, the Church of Ireland was the state church, funded by the taxes of all citizens. —James Field, Copyright © J.
