Doe vs. Bolton ... In 1973, the Supreme Court's Doe vs. Bolton decision was the companion case to Roe vs. Wade, making abortion legal throughout pregnancy. Sandra Cano, the "Mary Doe" plaintiff of Doe vs. Bolton, technically won the case and the right to have an abortion - except that she never wanted one. Sandra was always a pro-life Christian until her death in 2014. On March 23, 1997, she declared these memorable words: "I am Sandra Cano. I became known as Mary Doe when the U.S. Supreme Court released Doe v. Bolton, which allowed abortion for virtually any reason. I am against abortion; I never sought an abortion; I have never had an abortion. Abortion is murder. For over twenty years, and against my will, my name has been synonymous with abortion. The Doe v. Bolton case is based on deceit and fraud. I stand today in this place of healing, the National Memorial for the Unborn, and pledge to the memory of these innocent children, that as long as I have breath, I will strive to see abortion ended in America.'

PRAYERS FOR THE DEAD ...

An indulgence is granted the Christian faithful who devoutly visit a cemetery and pray, if only mentally, for the dead. This indulgence is applicable only to the souls in purgatory. This plenary indulgence is from Nov. 1 – 30 (all of Nov. due to COVID-19) & can be gained on each one of these days. On other days of the year this indulgence is a partial one. Due to Pandemic: The elderly, the sick and all those who for serious reasons cannot leave their homes, for example because of restrictions imposed by the competent authority in this time of the pandemic, ... will be able to obtain the Plenary Indulgence as long as they join spiritual with all the other faithful, completely detached from sin and with the intention of complying as soon as possible with the three usual conditions (sacramental confession, Eucharistic communion, and prayer according go the Holy Father's intentions), before an image of Jesus or the Blessed Virgin Mary, recite pious prayers for the deceased, for example ... the Rosary, Chaplet of Divine Mercy, other prayers for the deceased dearest to the faithful, or read a Gospel passage used at Funerals, or perform a work of mercy by offering to God the sorrows and hardships of their own lives.

An **indulgence** is the remission of the temporal punishment due to sins that have already been forgiven. An indulgence can be gained by doing certain works of devotion, penance & charity, under conditions the Church has set down. Besides the exclusion of all attachment to sin, even venial sin, the requirements for gaining a plenary indulgence are the performance of the indulgenced work and fulfillment of three conditions: sacramental confession, Eucharistic communion, prayer for the pope's intentions.

FROM FR. MARK SEIKER:

Diocese of Lincoln Guidelines (issued 11/10/20)

- Governor Ricketts announced on Monday new Directed Health Measures that take effect tomorrow, Nov. 11, and go through Nov. 30. <u>http://dhhs.ne.gov/Pages/COVID-19-Directed-Health-Measures.aspx</u>
- It is now required that there be 6 feet of separation between parties for churches and indoor gatherings. For churches, weddings, and funerals, parties are considered household members only.
- In light of the increased number of positive cases for Covid-19, all parishes are asked to follow the following guidelines for the Diocese of Lincoln up through November 30 and then we will re-evaluate:
 - Every other pew is to be blocked off in order to help facilitate the 6 feet social distancing requirement. [St. Elizabeth Ann Seton Church has done this since May.]
 - Encourage people to wear masks. [St. Elizabeth Ann Seton = since May.]
 [St. Elizabeth Ann Seton Church will begin offering a 6:30pm Saturday evening Mass (beginning Saturday, Nov. 14) where MASKS WILL BE REQUIRED TO BE WORN BY ALL THOSE WHO PARTICIPATE IN MASS. This is will continue as long as is needed, and/or possible (taking into account schedule limitations). This Mass is in addition to the usual Saturday 5:00pm Mass & Sunday 10:00am Mass. This is will continue as long as is needed, and/or possible (taking into account schedule limitations).]
 - Priests and acolytes are to wear masks when distributing Holy Communion. *[St. Elizabeth Ann Seton Church has done this since May.]*
 - There should be no congregational singing. Parishes may provide organ or other instrumental music. They may have a single cantor sing. *[St. Elizabeth Ann Seton Church will continue to invite Cantors to lead the singing at Sunday Masses (& Saturday Vigil Masses). The <u>Congregation may join in the singing in their minds</u>, but not with their voices during this time.]*
 - Missallettes & hymnals should not be provided for common use but may be provided for single use. [St. Elizabeth Ann Seton = since Aug. 22.]
 - Continue to clean & disinfect church pews, doors, bathrooms, etc. between Masses. [St. Elizabeth Ann Seton Church has done this since May.]
- The Governor's changes now limit Indoor gatherings to 25% of rated occupancy. This does not apply to churches provided 6 feet of social distancing is kept. However, this does apply to use of your social halls or CCD centers. [St. Elizabeth Ann Seton Church will continue to encourage parishioners to observe a social distance when in the Parish Hall. Teachers and Students have been and will continue to wear masks during the monthly classroom sessions for Family Formation.]
- You may want to consider splitting your CCD students and having the children attend on alternate weeks. [Not necessary at St. Elizabeth Ann Seton Church due to small classes & monthly Family Formation meetings.]
- Please check with & follow your local county health department recommendations & guidelines. [The WCDHD risk dial is now in the Red area at 3.65. The WCDHD webpage states: "This is guidance and does not replace federal, state, or local directed health measures. At-risk and vulnerable populations should take stringent precautions. The below is recommended guidance to help prevent and control the spread of COVID-19."]
- Thank you for all your efforts to cooperate with the local health guidelines so
 that we can keep our churches open. There are many states where churches
 aren't allowed to be open. We have been fortunate in that regard and we want
 this to continue to be the case.

Father Mark Seiker will continue to wear a mask when distributing Holy Communion. He will also begin wearing a mask when visiting with Parishioners after Mass either outside or in the Narthex. God gives us a free will. No one of us can make decisions for another person. God does not make decisions for us. Parishioners are encouraged to follow the guidance given by the Lincoln Diocese, as well as the local and State DHM's as well as the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention webpages: https://www.cdc.gov/coronavirus/2019-ncov/your-health/need-to-know.html It is also important to remember that Archbishop Lucas has suspended the obligation to attend Sunday and Holy Day Mass since March. This was done and continues to be done, so that someone who is not comfortable participating in Mass in-person, knows that they are not required to participate in Mass in person. There is the option for high risk / elderly persons who are choosing to not participate in Mass on Sunday in order to avoid the higher crowds to participate in a daily Mass during the week when there is plenty of social distance. In this way, they will stay safe and also be able to receive the spiritual sustenance of the Sacraments. If there are questions or concerns, I will attempt to answer them. We continue to pray for each other.

TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION ... All Christians in both East and West embraced the care of the sick as essential to church life. In the West, the importance of the visit of the priest is stressed, while in the East, the sick person is brought to the church for a full Liturgy of the Word. Some, such as the Armenians, even call it the "Ritual of the Lamp," since the oil is poured out of the lamp by which the Word is read. This may be why Eastern Christians sometimes anoint the sick with this oil, since the trip to church might kill them. Our tradition in the West also unfolded in monasteries, where it was possible for infirm monks to be attended with a full and beautifully consoling liturgy. In 950 the monks of St. Alban's Abbey in Mainz produced a ceremonial book that was instantly a pastoral hit everywhere. There were two lengthy rituals for the sick, one an extended vigil, and the other a liturgy of anointing that included Communion under both species. While this ritual was a house formula for monks, it is easy to see how monks who had the care of parishes desired to serve their parishioners in a similar way. The first form included the chanting of penitential psalms, and the second form required a confession beforehand. Both forms included a laying on of hands, which everyone understood as being an essential part of penance. -Copyright @ J.S. Paluch Co.

CHANGE OUR LIVES ... The letters of Paul to the Thessalonians are among his earliest writings, and are driven by his belief and the belief of the entire early Christian community that the return of Christ was imminent, and that devoting time or attention to anything else was foolish. As time progressed, this fervor subsided a bit. Today we may wonder, when we hear these readings about the coming end-times, if we should take them to heart, if we really believe that Christ still may come upon us as a "thief at night" (1 Thessalonians 5:2). Does this mean that we are to stop our long-range goal-setting, get rid of our yearly calendars and planners, or stop putting money in the college education fund? Of course not. What it does mean is that we need to change our lives, living like children of the light and illuminating the world around us with the light of the gospel. Then, on that day, when the details of our daily living become unimportant, we will be ready to find our peace and security in Christ Jesus. –Copyright © J. S. Paluch Co.
