Looking Back and Moving Forward

During the six weeks before Lent 2013 (in January and February), parishioners were encouraged to join in a Bible Study in the Parish Hall entitled "The Year of Faith: A Bible Study Guide for Catholics" by Fr. Mitch Pacwa. Also during the Year

of Faith, parishes in the Indianola Deanery participated in Eucharistic Holy Hours with reflections on the documents of Vatican II. Our Parish hosted Wednesday Suppers after the 5:30pm Mass & before the 7:00pm Holy Hours with free will offerings for the suppers going to the "Rice Bowl" for the poor.

In September 2013 workers from Ambiance by Design installed the remaining corbels in the sanctuary, some lettering on the frieze in the sanctuary, and the statues on St. Gabriel and St. Michael on the front façade. The quotes on the frieze in the sanctuary are:

- "See this Heart which has loved so much" ... words of Jesus to St. Margaret Mary Alacoque as He revealed His Sacred Heart.
- "Our look of love at Him draws back a look of love on us" ...
 words of St. Elizabeth Ann Seton, our patron Saint.
- Let us keep our eyes fixed on Jesus, who inspires and perfects our faith." ... words from the letter to the Hebrews 12:2.
- "I say nothing to him, I love him" ... St. Therese of Lisieux.

In October 2013, Stulich's Asphalt Sealing System LLC, from Ogallala, NE, repaired 470 lineal feet of large cracks, some small cracks in the Church parking lot & apply a sealing coat of Protectar Sealant to the entire parking lot at a cost of \$15,923.45.

The existing siding on the "Farm" Garage and the wood sills on some of windows of the "Farm" House were deteriorated & needed to be replaced. The Parish Building Committee and the Parish Council it was decided to have H & H Seamless Gutters install LP Smart Side siding on the "Farm" Garage & install one small Andersen window and three large Andersen windows on the "Farm" Rental House at a combined cost of \$20,500.00. This project will be paid for with money on hand in the Parish checking account, \$10,000.00 withdrawn from the Parish DIAL Operating Savings Account, and \$955.00 from Catholic Mutual (an insurance claim). These projects were done in November-December.

In January-February 2014, parishioners joined in a study by Fr. Robert Barron called: CATHOLICISM: The New Evangelization Study. During Lent, parishioners joined in a Study in the Parish Hall called "Oremus: A guide to Catholic Prayer" presented by Fr. Mark Toups.

In February 2014, our Parish purchased a new commercial dishwasher for the Parish Hall Kitchen at a cost of \$3,936.60. It will wash a load of dishes in about 3 minutes. It has been very helpful for Parish dinners hosted by the Daughters of Charity and the Knights of Columbus Breakfasts.

In March 2014, our Parish sponsored three different showings of the beautiful movie, Mary of Nazareth at the Carmike 6 Theater.

In March 2014, a new Listen Hearing Assist Transmitter was installed in the Parish Hall Sound System and the Sound System was adjusted. The quality of the sound was greatly improved and the same Hearing Assist Receivers that are available for use in the Church will also work in the Parish Hall.

In May 2014, Fr. Seiker began sending out emails to parishioners requesting prayers for the sick and deceased as well as providing current announcements of events in our parish.

In April our Parish hosted a Christian Passover Meal in the Parish Hall. This meal helped many persons to better understand the deep spiritual significance of some of the rituals of the Mass. Some parishioners observed that: "it was a most memorable experience! Thanks go out to: Fr. Seiker for his guidance; the prayerful assistance of Greg Vandenberg, Stephen Smock, Evan Mohr, Michael Krondak and Teri Volesky; the purchasing of a stupendous meal by Joan Ryland and Alice Robinson, which was prepared by Renate Nordquist, and served by Teri Volesky, Toni Barron, Joan Ryland and Alice Robinson. Thanks to all who gathered, prayed and feasted together!"

TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION ... Before the Second Vatican Council in the mid-1960s, Advent had a strong penitential tone, reminiscent of Lent. From as long ago as the fourth century, some Christians began a solemn fast on St. Martin's Day, November 11. This "Saint Martin's Lent" extended all the way to Christmas, and was widely followed in the dioceses of France and Germany, and in the Middle Ages in England. Fasting was required, and dancing and similar activities were banned for the duration. The fast had a social function, too, assuring that the winter food supplies would stretch into spring.

At the Second Vatican Council, some bishops argued that a revival of the long winter's fast would give the Church a chance to establish the message and themes of the Incarnation long before the holiday hubbub took hold. This proposal didn't pass, and Advent emerged as a four-week period of reflection, expectant waiting, and joyful preparation for the coming of the Lord. The season has two principal phases, with the first beginning this Sunday. The second phase commences on December 17, when the liturgy begins to unfold the story of the Savior's coming. Interestingly, the Eastern Church maintains a strongly penitential note in Advent, which is called "Winter Lent," "The Nativity Fast," or "Christmas Lent," and has laws forbidding people to absent themselves from liturgy from December 17 onward.

Act of Consecration of the Human Race to the Sacred Heart of Jesus

Most sweet Jesus, Redeemer of the human race, look down upon us humbly prostrate before Thy altar. We are Thine, and Thine we wish to be; but, to be more surely united with Thee, behold each one of us freely consecrates himself today to Thy Most Sacred Heart. Many indeed have never known Thee; many too, despising Thy precepts, have rejected Thee. Have mercy on them all, most merciful Jesus, and draw them to Thy Sacred Heart.

Be Thou King, O Lord, not only of the faithful who have never forsaken Thee, but also of the prodigal children who have abandoned Thee; grant that they may quickly return to their Father's house lest they die of wretchedness and hunger.

Be Thou King of those who are deceived by erroneous opinions, or whom discord keeps aloof; call them back to the harbor of truth and unity of faith, so that soon there may be but one flock and one Shepherd.

Be Thou King of all those who are still involved in the darkness of idolatry or of Islamism; refuse not to draw them all into the light and kingdom of God. Turn Thine eyes of mercy toward the children of that race, once Thy chosen people: of old they called down upon themselves the Blood of the Savior; may it now descend upon them a laver of redemption and of life.

Grant, O Lord, to Thy Church assurance of freedom and immunity from harm; give peace and order to all nations, and make the earth resound from pole to pole with one cry: Praise to the Divine Heart that wrought our salvation; to It be glory and Honor forever. Amen.

Act of Reparation to the Sacred Heart of Jesus

O sweet Jesus, Whose overflowing charity for men is requited by so much forgetfulness, negligence and contempt, behold us prostrate before Thy altar eager to repair by a special act of homage the cruel indifference and injuries, to which Thy loving Heart is everywhere subject.

Mindful alas! that we ourselves have had a share in such great indignities, which we now deplore from the depths of our hearts, we humbly ask Thy pardon and declare our readiness to atone by voluntary expiation not only for our own personal offenses, but also for the sins of those, who, straying far from the path of salvation, refuse in their obstinate infidelity to follow Thee, their Shepherd and Leader, or, renouncing the vows of their baptism, have cast off the sweet yoke of Thy Law.

We are now resolved to expiate each and every deplorable outrage committed against Thee; we are determined to make amends for the manifold offenses against Christian modesty in unbecoming dress and behavior, for all the foul seductions laid to ensnare the feet of the innocent, for the frequent violations of Sundays and holidays, and the shocking blasphemies uttered against Thee and Thy Saints.

We wish also to make amends for the insults to which Thy Vicar on earth and Thy priests are subjected, for the profanation, by conscious neglect or terrible acts of sacrilege, of the very Sacrament of Thy Divine Love; and lastly for the public crimes of nations who resist the rights and teaching authority of the Church which Thou hast founded.

Would, O divine Jesus, we were able to wash away such abominations with our blood. We now offer, in reparation for these violations of Thy divine honor, the satisfaction Thou didst once make to Thy eternal Father on the cross and which Thou dost continue to renews daily on our altars; we offer it in union with the acts of atonement of Thy Virgin Mother and all the Saints and of the pious faithful on earth; and we sincerely promise to make recompense, as far as we can with the help of Thy grace, for all neglect of Thy great love and for the sins we and others have committed in the past. Henceforth we will live a life of unwavering faith, of purity of conduct, of perfect observance of the precepts of the gospel and especially that of charity. We promise to the best of our power to prevent other from offending Thee and to bring as many as possible to follow Thee.

O loving Jesus, through the intercession of the Blessed Virgin Mary, our model in reparation, deign to receive the voluntary offering we make of this act of expiation; and by the crowning gift of perseverance keep us faithful unto death in our duty and the allegiance we owe to Thee, so that we may one day come to that happy home, where Thou with the Father and the Holy Ghost livest and reignest God, world without end. Amen.
