Looking Back and Moving Forward

In August 2015, we hired True Clean from North Platte to professionally clean the carpet in the Parish Hall, which was installed 8 years ago and is in need of some professional cleaning to help remove some stains & spots.

In August our parish became a partner in a dynamic faith formation program called *Symbolon* which in September became known as FORMED. This program is designed to help our parish form adults in the Catholic faith, and can be used in the parish and in parishioner's homes.

In August the Diocese of Lincoln hosted the first Annual Sacred Music Clinic in Lincoln. A number of our parishioners have participated in this annual clinic each year.

In the Fall of 2015 and the Spring of 2016, our Parish hosted ALPHA, a fun, relaxed, ten week process which involves shared meals, a DVD talk, and a discussion on the basics of the Christian faith.

In Nov, 2015, our Knights of Columbus Council #12530 introduced a 5th Sunday Rosary Program *(suggested by the KC Supreme Council)*. At 6:00pm, we prayed the Angelus & Rosary, & following the Rosary, at 6:30pm all went to the Parish Hall to enjoy some good food provided by the Knights of Columbus.

On December 8, 2015, Pope Francis opened the Holy Door at St. Peter's in Rome marking the beginning of the Year of Mercy. In February-March 2015, parishioners joined in a study by Dr. Tim Gray called: "Lectio - Prayer: Finding Intimacy with God" held two evenings each week. From April-June 2015, parishioners joined in a study by Fr. Michael Gaitley called: "Divine Mercy: in the Second Greatest Story Ever Told" held two evenings each week. On March 6-8, our Forty Hours Eucharistic Devotions talks were given by Msgr. Daniel Seiker on the theme "The Eucharist and Mercy".

On the evening of Memorial Day (May 30, 2016) at about 10:45pm, as Father Seiker was returning from a Jesus Caritas gathering in Lincoln with fellow priests, he was confronted with an overturned truck and semi trailer 7 miles west of Gothenburg on Interstate 80. With the westbound lanes completely blocked, Father's only real option after seeing the overturned vehicle shrouded in darkness, was to apply his brakes and skid into the vehicle at a bit lower speed. Father spent Tuesday through Friday morning in Good Samaritan Hospital in Kearney. Friday morning, June 3 he was transferred from Good Samaritan Hospital to Madonna Rehabilitation Hospital in Lincoln. His injuries consisted of fractures of his right foot and ligament injuries to his left lower leg. Additionally, Father has suffered multiple lacerations and contusions to his face and a serious concussion or closed head injury. On June 17 he moved to Bonacum House until July 6, when he returned to the Parish. He received physical therapy until September 16. With God's grace, there have not been any complications or health concerns resulting from the accident.

TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION ... We make transitions along life's journey, and search for meaning. Watch an infant take those first wobbly steps. REASON TO REJOICE ... Dark violet is used throughout Advent to express its character as a season of spiritual preparation for Christmas and "the coming of the Lord." But on the Third Sunday of Advent, formerly known as Gaudete (Latin for "rejoice") Sunday, rose may be added to the liturgical environment. The entire liturgy is infused with a spirit of rejoicing. Today's first reading and Gospel proclaim the reality of God's saving work in our midst. Isaiah exuberantly describes the idyllic transformation of all creation as a result of God's presence in the midst of the people. In the Gospel, Jesus connects Isaiah's prophecy with what is happening in his own ministry. In addition to the list of healings from Isaiah (the blind, the lame, lepers, and the deaf), Jesus' presence brings two other reasons for rejoicing: "The dead are raised, and the poor have the good news proclaimed to them" (Matthew 11:5).
