Charity & Stewardship Appeal CSA 2019

The goal for St. Elizabeth Ann Seton is **\$9,010.00**. These funds will be used for various programs funded by the Charity & Stewardship Appeal (CSA 2019).

Since we support a Catholic Grade School & High School, 80% of our goal & everything over our goal comes back to us, to help us provide Catholic education through our local Catholic School!

Just as we are one in the Body of Christ, we must remember that we are one with other parishes in our diocese. Once a year, our bishop asks each of us to make a commitment to support the work of our diocesan programs and ministries that provide services that no one parish could provide on its own. This effort is a means by which we can all work together to care for the Church by sharing the gifts God has granted us. Our parish goal is 100% participation. Please experience the joy of giving and join us as we work to continue God's work of spirituality, charity and education.

Over the last 25 years, St. Elizabeth Ann Seton Church has greatly benefited from The Charity and Stewardship Appeal (CSA): we have borrowed \$436,457.04 for Parish Hall, Rectory, & Farm. We borrowed \$1,485,000 for the new Church at very low interest rates. We have paid off loans for Parish Hall, Rectory, & "Farm". We still owe \$133,871.31 on Church loan. Though many parishioners have made significant contributions to Joy of the Gospel Campaign through pledges & other gifts, we need to continue to make a gift to CSA 2019 at a similar level as in previous years, & also use regular Sunday envelopes!

Divine Mercy and Pro-life ... Pope John Paul II declared the Sunday after Easter to be Divine Mercy Sunday. Many of the faithful pray the Chaplet of Divine Mercy regularly. There is a link between this devotion and the pro-life movement. Fr. Seraphim Michalenko, MIC, who was a principal translator of St. Faustina's diary, and the postulator of her cause of canonization, writes the following: *"On at least three occasions, from 8:00-11:00 in the evening, she felt like her insides were being torn apart. She suffered so much that she thought she was going to die. The doctors couldn't figure out what was ailing her, and no medication was able to alleviate her sufferings. Later, she was given to understand that she was undergoing those pains for mothers who were aborting their children"* (Diary, 1276).

"On another occasion, she had a vision of an angel coming with thunderbolts to destroy one of the most beautiful cities of her country. And she felt powerless to do anything about it (Diary, 474). What antidote did the Lord give her? The Chaplet of Divine Mercy. [She explained] that the city was to be chastised for its sins, primarily the sin of abortion." ("Wombs of Mercy," Marian Helpers Bulletin, Summer 1995, p. 13).

Looking Back and Moving Forward

After the Parish Hall was built, our first Confirmation was celebrated (06/02/1996), and our second CCD Summer School with the Marian Sisters was completed, Fr. Brethour suggested to Parishioners that it would be a good idea to have a Parish Bazaar / Festival. He thought this would be a good fund raiser, but also a way for our parishioners to work together. Parishioners researched Festivals that other Parishes held, and met together in Sept/Oct to plan our Festival. It was decided our Festival would be called a **"Pumpkin Festival"**.

Fr. Brethour wrote in the Oct. 27, 1996 Bulletin: *"Pumpkin Festival! was a great success. Thank you to all who helped. Our goal was to have a good time and provide an opportunity for others to see our parish and to meet old and new friends. This was certainly the result. In addition to achieving that goal, our profit was a little over \$1,200.00. Thank you to everyone. It was a fun afternoon. And who would have ever thought they would see Mother Theresa [one of our parishioners dressed up as Mother Teresa] smoking a cigarette?"*

Here is a general history/comparison of all the Pumpkin Festivals. Except 3 years, our Pumpkin Festival has always been on 2nd Sunday of October (profit=\$10,000 - \$16,000). (Info for some years not available now.)

1 10/20/1996 1:15pm - 5:00pm (3rd Wk Oct)
2 10/12/1997 1:00pm - 5:00pm (move indoors because it rained almost all day)
Fr. Brethour wrote in the summary notes: *"We had to move indoors because it was raining. We pushed all the pews as far forward as possible and used the classrooms and back halls for games and some food sales. We cancelled hayrides and Indian fry bread and hotdogs, because they all needed to be outside. Although it was very cramped, the festival was a huge success! People from all over town came and really enjoyed themselves. KNOP TV also showed up and ran a report on the evening news. This year's Festival proved that we could do it inside if we had to and that people will come no matter what the weather."*

When the weather is challenging, it calls for all of us (even more than usual) to adjust, to give, and to work together for each other and for the Lord. Thanks also to the many people who gave about 6 hours of their time on Saturday to do lots of preliminary set up so that in less than 20 minutes after the 10:00am Mass, the Hall could be ready for the Pumpkin Festival to be held inside."*

15 10/10/2010 11:00am - 4:00pm (1 hr rain; 4 hrs of very nice weather; largest number of people attending the Pumpkin Festival some could remember) (rent Big Tent)
16 10/09/2011 11:00am - 4:00pm (good weather; after Raffle Drawing rain started)
17 10/14/2012 11:00am - 4:00pm (very good weather; largest number of people attending Pumpkin Festival some could remember) Bought Big Tent from Camp Kateri.
18 10/13/2013 11:00am - 4:00pm (good weather for set-up; on Sunday, Temperature was good, but wind during Pumpkin Festival was pretty challenging)
19 10/12/2014 11:00am - 3:00pm (good weather for set-up; on Sunday, Temperature was good; missed rain in areas around us) Used Booth Banner attachments.
20 10/11/2015 11:00am - 3:00pm (very good set-up weather; very good weather for Pumpkin Festival (might have been a little warm, but the Lord is in charge of weather!))
21 10/09/2016 11:00am - 3:00pm (very good set-up weather; very good weather for Pumpkin Festival).
22 10/08/2017 11:00am - 3:00pm (very good set-up weather, some said it was the BEST weather we ever had for a Pumpkin Festival).
23 10/14/2018 11:00am - 3:00pm (good set-up weather; Sunday was cold & we were challenged by the "dusting of snow" that we received during the night. Some guess the "visiting crowd" was only 1/4-1/3 of a normal year; the weather was probably a factor in a reduced number of persons coming to our Pumpkin Festival.)

TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION ... An ancient title for this Sunday is *Dominica in Albis*, or "Sunday in White." During the Easter Vigil, the newly baptized are invested with a white garment, a sign that they have put on Christ. At one time, the garments were worn for a full week of celebration and reflection, and on this Sunday the newly baptized would appear in their robes again in their new place among the faithful for Eucharist.

In later centuries, the energy of new life at Easter was largely forgotten, and this Sunday was renamed "Quasimodo Sunday," or "Low Sunday." In recent years, with the recovery of the insight that Easter is the privileged time for celebrating and renewing baptism, there is nothing "Low" about this Sunday. At a week's distance, the beauty and grace of our Easter celebration is sustained by joyful alleluias, the blessing and sprinkling of holy water, and the comfort of the Lord's presence to us. He is risen, and he summons us together, opening up the scriptures for us, breaking the bread, filling us with new life. —James Field, Copyright © J. S. Paluch Co.

SEEING IS BELIEVING ... Seeing is believing! Since cellphone screens connect us instantly to social media, live TV, and loved ones' faces near and far, "Doubting Thomas" could be our patron saint: "Unless I see, I will not believe!" But how comforting for any of us who share Thomas's doubt, or love "doubters" who do, to see how kindly Jesus responds. By offering the very evidence that Thomas demanded, Jesus doesn't scold Thomas, but seems to understand such skepticism. Could Jesus have been thinking of us, who long to believe that "Jesus is risen!" but see so much suffering, and perhaps even cause some, that we wonder, how could something so wonderful be true? In today's reading from the Acts of the Apostles, the risen Jesus' healing love comforts through disciples who love others. 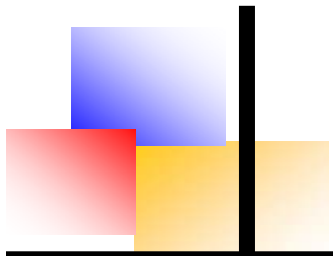
