The Diocese of Lincoln requires that its employees and volunteers report any allegations of abuse or neglect of a minor or elder connected with church related activity to law enforcement, consistent with the requirements of Nebraska law. If anyone has information that a minor or elder is being or has been subjected to abuse or neglect please report it immediately to local law enforcement or to the Nebraska Department of Health and Human Services toll-free number 1-800-652-1999, and also to any Parish Pastor, School Administrator, Teacher, or to any Diocesan official at the Catholic Chancery (402) 488-0921, so that immediate steps may be taken for the protection of the minor or elder.

Starting January 1, 2025, all clergy, religious, lay employees, and volunteers in the Diocese of Lincoln are required to complete and/or renew safe environment training in the month of January. This will require a new background check if there is no current one on file or if a previous one has expired.

This training does not change the policy on background checks, which requires a background check be completed every five (5) years. Anyone whose duties, ministries or organizations that include any contact with minors are required to complete safe environment training (e.g. CCD teachers and aides, acolytes, lectors, readers, youth choir director or organizations such as Altar Society or Knights of Columbus where children may help). All clergy and religious, regardless of assignment or ministry, are required to complete safe environment training. in January 2025. Thereafter, all clergy, religious, employees, and volunteers (in contact with youth) will renew training every January. God, Our Spouse and Lord of Life: "As a bridegroom rejoices in his bride, so shall your God rejoice in you." Today's first reading from Isaiah shows us how much God delights in human life. One winter tourist to another: If you think it is cold here try going to Canada. Their expression that you think something is very, very cold sums it up. Colder than a brass toilet seat in the Yukon (The Yukon is a province in the northwest of Canada that is one of the coldest places on earth.

Temperatures can drop to a staggering minus 60 degrees Fahrenheit.)

Candlemas Day (Feb 2) is another name for the feast of the Presentation of the Lord. Forty days after His birth, Mary and Joseph brought Jesus to the temple for the rites of purification and dedication as prescribed by the Torah. According to the Book of Leviticus (12:1-4), when a woman bore a male child, she was considered "unclean" for seven days. On the eighth day, the boy was circumcised. The mother continued to stay at home for 33 days for her blood to be purified. After the 40 days, the mother and the father came to the temple for the rite of purification, which included the offering of a sacrifice — a lamb for a holocaust (burnt offering) and a pigeon or turtledove for a sin offering, or for a poor couple who could not afford a lamb, two pigeons or two turtledoves. Note Joseph and Mary made the offering of the poor (Lk 2:24). Candlemas Day also was important in the lives of farmers. An old English song went as follows: "If Candlemas be fair and bright, / Come, Winter, have another flight. / If Candlemas brings clouds and rain, / Go, Winter, and come not again." So if the bright sun "overshadows" the brightness of Candlemas Day, there will be more winter. However, if the light of Candlemas Day radiates through the gloom and darkness of the day, the end of winter is near. In America, Protestants decided we should replace Catholic Candlemas Day with Groundhog Day.
