Be aware of "satanic" rosaries. Many Catholics are devoted to praying the rosary and honoring Our Lady's request to pray the rosary. Rosaries can be very ornate and custom-made, as well as very simple and inexpensive. However, we need to be aware of the circulation of "satanic" rosaries that may be infested or cursed. These rosaries are typically plastic and have odd symbols on them. For example, "the symbols could be a snake wrapped around the cross, a pentagram, and/or a sun with rays, an insignia of the Illuminati" which is a Satanist's group. Typically, these rosaries have been infested or cursed by those that make them, "consecrating them to evil so that whoever uses it will be followed by evil spirits." What should you do if you have a "satanic" rosary at home or find one in your possession? If you discover that you have one or more of these "satanic" rosaries in your possession, please bring them to a priest. He will then properly destroy and dispose of them so that they can no longer pose a spiritual threat to anyone. (Reference:

We Have To Choose: Many have lost a measure of joy in life. Sometimes it is the weight of life itself disappointments, regrets for wrong words or choices, grief at the loss of a loved one, unremitting loneliness, unhealed scars, an aging body, or just plain tiredness of living. Gaudeamus Weekend is a good time to renew and reconnect with the source of our hope and joy. There are two kinds of joy. The first is a natural joy that comes and goes according to the situation. It is dependent on externals. Some, out of their own emptiness, insist that others (or society or circumstances) must make them happy. Natural joy is often moody because there is no sure and true anchor. On the other hand, there is another kind of joy. It is a supernatural joyfulness that is pervasive and lasting. In its essence, it is joy in the Lord. It gives an entirely new coloring to life. We begin to perceive everything in a completely new light. This kind of joy does not come and go with our mood, nor is it

dependent on others. Because this supernatural joy is neither self-referential nor self-absorbed, it discovers wonderful sources of joy. We find joy in being grateful to our good and gracious God, and in His bottomless love for us. We find joy in our prayer in whatever form it takes. We find joy for opportunities for repentance, for healing, and for forgiveness. We find joy in the gift of ourselves through service to family or others. We find joy in goodness, truth, and beauty. Most of all, in this Advent season, we find joy in kneeling in prayer awaiting the Child Jesus. The mystery is that we do not need to wait for joy to come in the morning. The secret is that joy must be chosen. Despite circumstances, even amidst struggles, setbacks, disappointments, or sadness, we must trust in God, and then choose joy. It is joy in the Lord, who is our rock, our shepherd, and lover of our soul. It is the saints who found great joy because they knew Jesus. St. Paul suffered greatly in his ministry, but he never lost his joy because he had discovered the source of all joy—that of Christ Jesus Himself. When joy is chosen, it is a gift received but must be passed on to others. Clinging to joy for ourselves alone becomes like sand slipping through our fingers. Choosing joy connects us to hidden aquifers of grace. Wellsprings of the joy of the Holy Spirit begin to overflow from within our souls. Joy in the Lord, mixed with repentant humility and unshakeable peace, will touch countless people around us. As Paul reminds us, "Rejoice in the Lord always; again I say, rejoice. Indeed, the Lord is near" (Phil 4:4-5). Indeed, joyfully, He is very near.-- author unknown.

What should you do if you encounter a situation which keeps you from fulfilling your Sunday obligation? Every attempt should be made to take part in the Liturgy of the Word through reading or listening to the Mass readings in your home. Spend time in prayer. Pray specifically for all those who are also unable to attend Mass. Make a Spiritual Communion. Observe the day of rest and avoid all unnecessary work.

Questions to ask oneself for an Examination of Conscience

Have I sinned against Religion by seriously believing in New Age, Scientology, Astrology, Horoscopes, Fortune-telling, Superstition or engaging in the Occult? Have fame, fortune, money, career, pleasure, etc. replaced God as my highest priority? Have I neglected my daily prayers? Have I committed blasphemy by using the name of God and Jesus Christ to swear rather than to praise? Have I committed sacrilege by showing disrespect to holy objects (crucifix, rosary) or contempt for religious persons (bishop, priests, deacons, women religious) or for sacred places (in Church). Have I committed sacrilege by going to Holy Communion in the state of mortal sin without first going to confession e.g., after missing Mass on Sunday or a Holyday? Did I violate the one-hour fast before Communion? Did I miss Mass on any Sunday or Holyday of Obligation? (Bad weather and being sick do not count) Did I do unnecessary work on Sunday which could have been done the day before? Have I been stingy in my support for the Church? Do I give of my time & talent? Do I witness a desire to be at peace with God and neighbor? Have I set a bad example for my children by casually missing Mass, neglecting prayer, or ignore my responsibility to instruct at home or provide a Catholic education by either sending my children to parochial school or to C.C.D. Do I show little or no interest in my children's faith and practice of it? Have I showed disrespect for those in authority, government or church? Have I become rigid or lax putting my beliefs of more importance than what the Church requires or teaches? Do I judge others by acting like a policeman for the faith? Did I consent, recommend, advise, approve, support or have an abortion? Did I realize that there is an excommunication for anyone who procures an abortion? Did I actively or passively cooperate with an act of euthanasia whereby ordinary means were stopped or means taken to directly end the life of an elderly or sick person? Have I committed an act of violence or abuse (physical, sexual, emotional or

verbal)? Have I endangered the lives of others by reckless driving or by driving under the influence of drugs or alcohol? Do I show contempt for my body by neglecting to take care of my own health? Have I been mean or unjust to anyone? Have I held a grudge or sought revenge against someone who I felt wronged me? Do I complain more than I compliment? Am I ungrateful for what other people do for me? Do I tear people down rather than encourage them? Do I seek to be the center of attention? Did I have any sex before or outside of marriage? Do I view pornographic material (magazines, videos, internet, hot-lines)? Did I commit the sins of masturbation and/or artificial contraception? Have I not avoided the occasions of sin (persons or places) which would tempt me to be unfaithful to my spouse or to my own chastity? Do I encourage and entertain impure thoughts and desires? Do I tell or listen to dirty jokes? Have I committed fornication or adultery? Have I stolen any object, committed any shoplifting or cheated anyone of their money? Did I knowingly deceive someone in business or commit fraud? Have I shown disrespect or even contempt for other people's property? Have I done any acts of vandalism? Am I greedy or envious of another's goods? Do I let financial and material concerns or the desire for comfort override my duty to God, to Church, to my family or my own spiritual wellbeing? Have I told a lie in order to deceive someone? Have I told the truth with the purpose and intention of ruining someone's reputation (sin of detraction)? Have I told a lie or spread rumors which may ruin someone's reputation (sin of calumny or slander)? Am I a busybody or do I love to spread gossip and secrets about others? Do I love to hear bad news about my enemies?

Act of Contrition: O my God, I am heartily sorry for having offended Thee, and I detest all my sins because I dread the loss of Heaven and fear the pains of hell, but most of all, because they offend Thee, my God, who art all good and worthy of all my love. I firmly intend with the help of Thy grace to confess my sins, to do penance and to amend my life. AMEN
