<u>On Ash Wednesday</u>, fasting is obligatory from age 18 until age 59. When fasting, a person is permitted to eat one full meal, as well as two smaller meals that together are not equal to a full meal. Abstinence from meat is binding upon all from age 14 onwards Ash Wednesday and Fridays of Lent.

The Declaration of Independence boldly affirms that first among our inalienable rights is the right to life, given to us by the Creator. Yet despite being so solemnly proclaimed, the right to life is today threatened and often denied, particularly at the moments when life is most fragile. Our laws should-first and foremost-protect life. Even with the overturning of Roe v. Wade, many states still do not recognize children in their mothers' wombs as persons and still claim that abortion is a right. Further, many political leaders work actively to increase access to abortion. Some falsely describe it as health care and even as a basic human right. Laws and policies that legalize or promote an intrinsic evil like abortion violate the virtue of justice. Those who work as public officials and civic leaders have a duty to serve the common good, and therefore have a profound obligation to safeguard this most fundamental right to life. Through our own prayer, witness, and civic participation, we can encourage our leaders to truly answer their call to protect the rights of all people. For "there can be no true democracy without a recognition of every person's dignity and without respect for his or her rights" (Evangelium vitae 101).

National Eucharistic Pilgrimage—mark your calendars for two events that will be held at SEAS. Friday, June 14 a Holy Hour of Adoration will begin at 6:30pm and Saturday, June 15 a Mass will be held at 8:00am. Both are in conjunction with Holy Spirit's and St. Patrick's Parishes of North Platte. In addition, there will be a Mass held at McDaid Elementary School on June 16 at 11:00am and a Eucharistic Procession the same day, following the Mass at McDaid Elementary School.

<u>Anointing of the Sick</u> will be given immediately after the morning Mass on Tuesday, February 6. Any Catholic who is able to receive communion and is suffering from a life-threatening illness or disease, will have an upcoming surgery, or is over the age of 65, is welcome to receive the Sacrament. If you have any questions about whether you can or should receive the sacrament, speak to Fr. Rand.

For those wishing to incorporate a weekly Mass,

Stations of the Cross, or Adoration into their Lenten plans, the tentative schedule for Wednesdays of Lent (February 21-all of March) will be Stations at 5:30pm, Mass at 6:00pm, followed by Adoration until 9:00pm. In addition, one could use these means also to gain a plenary indulgence by adoring the Lord in the Blessed Sacrament during Adoration for at least a half-hour, praying with the Parish the Stations of the Cross, or reading sacred scripture with devotion for at least a half-hour. However, we must remember there are some stipulations provided which must be met in order for the indulgences to be plenary. If all the conditions are not met, we receive partial indulgences, but not plenary indulgences. Conditions to be met: 1.) Sacramentally confess your sins in Confession within 20 days before or after the indulgent act. (one sacramental Confession is sufficient for several indulgences) 2.) Be in a state of grace (which you receive from Confession) and have a complete detachment from sin. This does not mean that you are to be sinless, but you are to have a detachment from sin. 3.) Pray for the intentions of the Holy Father. You can do this by simply reciting the Our Father and one Hail Mary for the intentions of the Holy Father. 4.) Reception of Holy Communion (must receive Holy Communion for each plenary indulgence sought) It is permissible that Holy Communion may be received several days before or after obtaining the indulgence, but it is preferable it is received the same day of the indulgent act. 5.) One must have a general intention of gaining an indulgence beforehand.
