<u>When we make</u> a Holy Hour, we remain and stay awake with Jesus. It's a powerful and beautiful way to grow closer to Him. Making a Holy Hour helps us to grow more into his likeness. We become like that which we contemplate. Looking into a sunset, the face takes on a golden glow. Being with our Eucharistic Lord for an hour transforms the heart in a mysterious way as the face of Moses was transformed after his companionship with God on the mountain.

"One of the easiest ways for the devil to infiltrate our lives is through unchecked anger. Anger isn't a bad feeling to have. The desire for true justice is praiseworthy, and our feelings of anger can sometimes fuel us in our efforts to protect our family or the most vulnerable of society. However, when anger crosses the line and is let loose, it can leave us vulnerable to the devil. St. Paul warns us plainly in his letter to the Ephesians, Be angry but do not sin; do not let the sun go down on your anger, and give no opportunity to the devil (Ephesians 4:26-27). We see from this passage that anger is not initially a bad feeling, but it can become sinful if we leave it unchecked and uncontrolled. The key lies in our intentions and what we want to do with that anger. The Catechism of the Catholic Church explains the dark side of anger when commentating on the fifth commandment. If anger reaches the point of a deliberate desire to kill or seriously wound a neighbor, it is gravely against charity; it is a mortal sin. the Lord says, Everyone who is angry with his brother shall be liable to judgment. Deliberate hatred is contrary to charity. Hatred of the neighbor is a sin when one deliberately wishes him evil. Hatred of the neighbor is a grave sin when one deliberately desires him grave harm. (CCC 2302-2303) When we allow this type of anger to boil over within us, the devil is given a back door into our soul. It is his desire to fan the flame of our anger and to convince us that the only way we can satiate this desire is to inflict harm upon another person. As much as we may want to inflict harm upon

someone who has been unjust in any way, Jesus challenges us to, "Love your enemies and pray for those who persecute you" (Matthew 5:44)".--(excerpted and summarized from Philip Koslocki -Aleteia Sept.2019) Anger must not have the last say at the end of the day. The longer it festers within our heart, the more likely we will act out in anger and hurt other people by starting with judging them, blaming, holding them to our own perceptions, standards and opinions and not allowing the fullness of love, mercy and forgiveness to find a home in our hearts. The Divine Mercy devotion is a spiritual medicine to keep our hearts healthy in the love of God and our neighbor.

Summer Bible Study on Matthew: The position of the Gospel according to Matthew as the first of the four gospels in the New Testament reflects the view that it was the first to be written, a view that goes back to the late second century A.D. It also shows the esteem in which it was held by the church. No other was so frequently quoted in the non-canonical literature of earliest Christianity. The reason for that becomes clear upon studying the way in which Matthew presents his story of Jesus, the demands of Christian discipleship, and the breaking-in of the new and final age through the ministry, and particularly through the death and resurrection of Jesus. Would you like to learn more? Is the Holy Spirit calling you to dive into Matthew to broaden your understanding in application to living out your faith in Christ? This Bible study is open to anyone high school age and above. It will meet most Mondays from 5:30 pm-6:30 pm from May 1-August 28. Registration is necessary in order for the class to be prepared. It will be given with both lecture time on Matthew by Fr. Rand and participation time by those attending. It will include reading the noted chapters each week before the class meets. It is encouraged to take notes for a written reflection to review again in prayer and the spiritual life. While it is understood that occasionally, one may have to be absent, these should be exceptions and not the rule, out of respect for the time involved in preparing for it.
