Last week, the U.S. Senate declined to advance a resolution asserting that the "Equal Rights Amendment" has been ratified as a new amendment to the Constitution of the United States. "The Catholic faith teaches that women and men are created with equal dignity, and we support that being reflected in law," explained Bishop Michael F. Burbidge of Arlington, chairman of the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops' (USCCB) Committee on Pro-Life Activities. "The proposed

'Equal Rights Amendment,' however, would likely create a sweeping new nationwide right to abortion at any stage, at taxpayer expense, and eliminate even modest protections for women's health and the lives of preborn children. It could also pose grave problems for women's privacy and athletic and other opportunities, and negatively impact religious freedom. Bishop Burbidge was joined by other chairmen of USCCB committees in a letter to Congress this past February where they voiced their opposition to the resolution: Cardinal Timothy M. Dolan of New York, chairman of the Committee for Religious Liberty, Archbishop Borys Gudziak of the Ukrainian Catholic Archeparchy of Philadelphia, chairman of the Committee on Domestic Justice and Human Development, and Bishop Robert E. Barron of Winona-Rochester, chairman of the Committee for Laity, Marriage, Family Life, and Youth.

May Crowning is celebrated in the month of May where an image or statue of Mary is crowned with a wreath of flowers and honored as the Queen of Heaven and the Mother of God. It carries deeper meaning for the Catholic faithful. Unlike most holidays, May Crowning doesn't have a set date and can be celebrated at any time during the month of May. There is no set ritual, but traditionally, May Crownings are celebrated connected to the Mass, at which a crown of flowers and/or herbs is placed on the head of a statue of Mary. While Mary, the Mother of God, is revered and celebrated all year long, May is a special month to celebrate the "Queen of Heaven." May has been Mary's month since the medieval period, when May was considered the end of winter and the start of a new season of growth. It's a time for new beginnings and the chance to begin with gratitude and devotion. There are many reasons she is considered the "Queen of Heaven." She was a perfect follower of Christ, and so is considered the Crown of Creation. She is also the Mother of the Son of God, Jesus, who is the King of Israel and the universe. She is the most important woman of our faith, and our spiritual mother.

If we love this adorable Heart, we will wish to unite ourselves to it, for love seeks union; we will wish to warm our hearts by the ardor of this divine fire; but to reach the Sacred Heart, to take hold of it, to put it in contact with our own, what shall we do? Shall we scale heaven to bear away the Heart of Jesus who reigns triumphant in glory? There is no need to do so. We will go to the Blessed Eucharist, we will go to the tabernacle, we will take the white Host, and when we have enclosed it in our breast, we will feel the divine Heart truly beating beside our own. Devotion to the divine Heart infallibly brings souls to the Blessed Eucharist, and faith in and devotion to the Blessed Eucharist necessarily lead souls to discover the mysteries of Infinite Love of which the divine Heart is the organ and the symbol. If we believe in the Blessed Eucharist, we believe in Love. It is the mystery of Love. But in itself love is immaterial and imperceptible. To fix our minds and our senses, we seek an outward form for love. This form, this sensible manifestation, is the divine Heart. The Sacred Heart, the Blessed Eucharist, and Love are one and the same thing. In the tabernacle we find the Host; in the Host, Jesus; in Jesus, his Heart; in his Heart, Love—infinite Love, divine charity, God, the principle of life, living and life-giving. --Venerable Louise Margaret Claret de la Touche

Going to Lincoln—take a moment to stop by 1040 South Cotner Blvd and pray before the Blessed Sacrament with the "Pink Sisters"--In 1896, Saint Arnold Janssen and Mother Mary Michaele founded the Sister Servants of the Holy Spirit of Perpetual Adoration in Holland. The Sisters' rose-colored habit symbolizes joy in honor of the Holy Spirit and the Sisters' adoration before the Blessed Sacrament. Bishop Flavin invited the Sister Servants of the Holy Spirit of Perpetual Adoration to the Lincoln Diocese in 1973. They were the first Community of cloistered contemplative nuns to take up residence in Lincoln. Bishop Flavin established the King's Men, a Pink Sisters Auxiliary of women, and the Ladies of the Eucharist, which are all associated with the Sisters. The Community continues its prayerful presence in the Lincoln Diocese and intercedes for it and the people of the Diocese of Lincoln.

<u>The Easter season is</u> nearing its end. Are we closer in the conversion of our hearts and minds to the Christlike example to which we have been invited? The fruits of having made a good Lent and nurtured by the Easter season will provide much not only for ourselves but for the world in which we live.
