<u>Uncle Sol decided</u> to party, even though he just passed his 90th birthday. The super senior put on his best blue pin-striped suit, Pierre Cardin tie shoes and looked in the mirror. "Eh, Solly you old dog, still a lady killer," he said to himself, putting a carnation in his lapel, as he made his way to the lounge in the Fontainebleau Hotel. Seeing a lovely lady in her late eighties. Sol strolled over, took the stool beside her and ordered a Dr. Pepper. When it arrived, he sipped it slowly, turned slyly to the lady and asked: "So darling, do I come here very often?"

Those attending the recent Daughters of Charity meeting discussed changing the meeting days, as suggested by several members of the Parish. By changing from the 2nd Sunday of the month to the 4th Sunday of the month, members would have more of an opportunity to attend the K of C Breakfast, not bring their breakfast to the meeting, and also be able to enjoy breakfast with family and friends. It was also discussed reducing the number of meetings held during the fiscal year. Keeping this change in mind, the Daughters plan to meet on the following Sundays after Mass: Sunday, August 25, 2024, Sunday, September 22, 2024, Sunday, November 24, 2024 Sunday, January 26, 2025, Sunday, March 23, 2025, Sunday, May 18, 2025 (3rd Sunday due to Memorial Day weekend on the 4th Sunday) and Sunday July 27, 2025 for the current fiscal year. The bulletin will also have a reminder each month of the meeting day and time. Meeting dates could be added if necessary. The annual receptions, events, potlucks, fundraisers, etc. will not change.

The word "genuflect" means to bend, as in flex, the knee. This simple act is a way to fulfill what the Lord swears in Isaiah 45:23, which is repeated in St. Paul's letter to the Romans 14:11 and echoed in

Philippians 2:10: "To me every knee shall bend." The manner of bending the knee is to touch the ground with one's right knee. Genuflecting is a gesture of obedience and humility used before a king or queen, and most appropriately used before God. Catholics genuflect toward the tabernacle normally at the beginning and end of Mass especially just before entering the pew to begin praying, but whenever they pass in front of the tabernacle at other times during visits to a church. Within the tabernacle is found the Blessed Sacrament; Jesus, who is made present in the Mass, remains present in the Body in the tabernacle for those who come to pray or for those who will need to receive Him because they are sick or homebound. We know Jesus is present in the tabernacle when we see a candle burning in typically a red globe close by. Usually his presence is found at all times during the year except Good Friday when Jesus is housed outside the sanctuary to create the environment of the tomb. When genuflection is not possible due to physical limitations and inabilities one bows to show his or her reverence.

A Cursillo is an encounter with Christ. Cursillo (pronounced kur-see-yo) is a Spanish word meaning "little" or "short course." It begins on a Thursday evening and ends the following Sunday night. During those three days those attending live and work together listening to talks given by priests and laity. They also share the Eucharist and pray together. The "after" activity of the Cursillo is known as the "fourth day." During this time perseverance is important. The community spirit is continued after the three days through the "ultreya" or reunions of the community. These are available monthly as a means of growth in understanding and zeal within the Christian community. Reunions of smaller groups of friends are also available. The goal of the Cursillo movement is to make Christ the prime influence in society. The primary objectives of the Cursillo Movement are to develop in adult Christians a consciousness of their power and mission to become leaders in the work of Christian renewal, and to sustain them as they provide a Christian leaven in civic, social and economic life. This "Christianizing of environments" is the mission of the Cursillo Movement. Cursillo was founded in Spain in the 1940's and found its way to the United States in 1957. The first Cursillo in the Lincoln Diocese was held in 1965.
