The Holy Father has appointed Rev. Monsignor Richard Allen Gyhra (whose home Diocese is Lincoln) Nunciature Counsellor, as Permanent Observer of the Holy See to the United Nations and Specialized Institutions in Vienna and to the United Nations Industrial Development Organization (UNIDO), as well as Permanent Representative of the Holy See to the International Atomic Energy Agency (A.I.E.A.), the Comprehensive Nuclear Test Ban Treaty Implementation Organization (C.T.B.T.O.) and the Organization for Security and Cooperation in Europe (O.S.C.E.). Monsignor Gyhra, has, up to now, been serving at the Pontifical Delegation in Tanzania. Msgr. Gyhra will formally take up duties in Vienna in September.

Jack strode into 'John's Stable' looking to buy a horse. "Listen here" said John, "I've got just the horse you're looking for. The only thing is, he was trained by an interesting fellow. He doesn't go and stop the usual way. The way to get him to stop is to scream heyhey, and the way to get him to go is to scream Thank God. Jim nodded his head, "fine with me, can I take him for a test run?" Jim was having the time of his life. This horse sure could run, he thought to himself. Jim was speeding down the dirt road when he suddenly saw a cliff up ahead. "Stop!" screamed Jim, but the horse kept on going. No matter how much he tried, he could not remember the words to get it to stop. "Yoyo!" screamed Jim, but the horse just kept on speeding ahead. It was 5 feet from the cliff when Jim suddenly remembered to scream "heyhey!". The horse skidded to a halt just 1 inch from the cliff. Jim could not believe his good fortune. He looked up to the sky, raised his hands in the air, breathed a deep sigh of relief, and said with conviction "Thank God."

<u>Call No Man Father</u>: On occasion you will encounter one of our separated brethren who will criticize Catholics because they call their priest "father," citing Matthew 23:9 "And call no man your father upon the earth: for one is your Father, who is in heaven." If one takes this passage literally,

this might seem to be a fair criticism. What does this individual call their male parent? Daddy? Papa (which, incidentally, is Italian for Pope)? When they fill out a credit application what do they put in the block which asks for their father's name -- God? Obviously, there is a meaning of this scriptural passage other than the literal one. This meaning is that there is only one creator, from whom all 'fatherhood' comes (Ephesians 3:14-15). This does not preclude addressing someone as "father" so long as you understand that all fatherhood (both biological and spiritual) originates with God the Father. We are all members of God's family; a fact we acknowledge every time we recite the 'Our Father' or the Creed. Paul calls himself a "father" in 1 Thessalonians 2:11 "As ye know how we exhorted and comforted and charged every one of you, as a father does his children." and again in 1 Corinthians 4:15 "For though ye have ten thousand instructors in Christ, yet have ye not many fathers: for in Christ Jesus I have begotten you through the gospel." In both of these passages Paul considers himself a spiritual father just as the priest is today. This same interpretation is presented by John in 1 John 2:13-14 where he says twice "I write unto you, fathers because ye have known him that is from the beginning." Finally, you might ask this individual if he or she is familiar with the New International Version of the Bible (a common modern Protestant translation). If so, refer him or her to Matthew 23:10, the passage immediately after the one quoted to you: "Nor are you to be called 'teacher,' for you have one Teacher, the Christ". Even they have Sunday School teachers. -St Charles Borromeo Parish, Mississippi.

A heart aimed at the goal of faithfulness, rather than perfection, is daily in tune with the voice of the Father. Our God is never saying to us, "Perform, impress, excel, earn my love." Instead, His call is to "rest, obey, listen, love, surrender, give, receive." We serve a faithful God who calls us to a life of daily faithfulness. I emphasize "daily" because I believe that God is only ever asking us to live one moment at a time. In fact, faithfulness has everything to do with the present moment, not all of the possibilities coming down the line. We see this truth echoed again and again in the lives of the saints. These faithful men and women kept their eves on Jesus in the present moment. Certainly, they brought Him into plans for the future; but they didn't live consumed with what was coming next. They lived day by day, knowing well that they were not promised tomorrow and that today contained enough with which to occupy oneself (Matthew 6:34). If we are to be faithful stewards to our Lord, and experience His peace in that endeavor, then we must walk ourselves back to living more in the present moment. I think that when we do this, we are much more inclined toward His plan, rather than our own. We are able to let go of all expectations that we place upon our own shoulders. We simply ask, "What have you given me to do today, or in *this moment, Lord?*" He will reveal it. We may need to apply the process of discernment and quiet listening to His direction. Living moment-bymoment with our faithful God, we become more faithful. As we are being transformed, we more readily recognizing the contrast between a faithful life and one imprisoned in the confines of perfectionism:

- Perfectionism tries to control; faithfulness surrenders.
- Perfectionism piles on unrealistic tasks; faithfulness asks God what He means us to carry.
- Being bound by perfection, we always feel like our efforts fall short; drawn by a faithful God, we give simply what we have to give.
- The perfectionist holds tightly to the desired end result; the faithful servant puts the result into God's hands.

God is only asking us to be faithful with the specific task He means for us to do in the present moment.

We will realize peace and contentment when we surrender to that act for love of Him and place the result in His hands. We are only asked to be faithful with what we have to give; our faithful God is in charge of the rest. We will certainly have days where we fail, when we listen to the wrong voice and fall prey to the desire to control. Thankfully, our God's faithfulness is steadfast (as we are told repeatedly throughout the Psalms), and He never fails us. His mercies are new every morning (Lamentations 3:22-23). *Excerpt from "Catholic Mom" Jessica Ptomey*

Marriage Preparation in the Diocese of Lincoln: As Catholics, we firmly believe that marriage is a most sacred commitment that deserves the careful attention and preparation on the part of all who are involved: the couple, the priest and the Church. At least one of the parties should be a registered and practicing member of the parish. In the case where both of the parties have moved from the parish and still have family connections, and they would like the wedding at St. Elizabeth Ann Seton Parish, one or the other of the parties should present a letter from their home pastor giving permission for the wedding to take place here and be prepared by their home pastor or the pastor of St ElizabethAnn Seton with permission of the current pastor. The Sacrament of Matrimony is not done because the church is convenient or aesthetically more pleasing. Please contact the pastor to schedule your wedding. This is to be done at least 6 months prior (although it is strongly suggested to do it a year in advance) of your projected wedding date. Please note that no dates are final until all the requirements for the marriage set forth by the Church have been satisfactorily completed. The requirements are as follows:

- Completion of a Pre-Nuptial Investigation
- Completion of the FOCCUS Premarital Inventory
- The submission of current copies of baptismal certificates, and affidavits of freedom to marry.
- Attendance at and Engaged Encounter Weekend sponsored by the Family Life Office of the Diocese of Lincoln.

In order to preserve the sacredness and dignity proper to Christian marriage, all wedding ceremonies must conform to the guidelines of the Diocese of Lincoln.

- Liturgical Celebration: the marriage of two Catholics is ordinarily celebrated within the context of Mass. If one of the parties is baptized, but not a Catholic, the wedding is usually celebrated during a Liturgy of the Word Service.
- 2. Reception of Holy Communion: it is the Church's policy that only practicing Roman Catholics may receive Holy Communion at Mass. If your wedding will take place during Mass, it is your responsibility to instruct non-Catholics of this policy.
- 3. Music: All matters relating to music should be approved by the celebrant. All music chosen must be sacred in character, that is written with the intention of glorifying Almighty God. Popular songs, love songs and the like should be played at the reception, not during the church service.
